OPPOSE THE INCREASE.

The business men of the city will be called upon tonight to decide what attitude shall be taken towards the proposed increase in telephone charges. It is to be hoped that there will be but one decision—absolute and irrevocable opposition to it. Klamath Falls has a straight out contract with the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company which provides for certain charges for phones in this city. Through some legerdemain the corporations of the state secured the enactment of the law creating the so-called Public Service Commission, whose chief duties of late seem to be to serve the corporations and not the public, and by a decision of our esteemed State Supreme Court—a decision that astounded some of the brightest legal minds of the state—this law sets aside everything but the decisions of this Commission. For the first time in the history of this grand old state we are told that a contract that is flawless is a mere "scrap of paper," and therefore Klamath Falls, thru the active aid and assistance of this Commission, is to be robbed monthly by the telephone company. There is just one barrier to the theft—the business men of the city, and

if they have the backbone to oppose it, they will win out. Commission or no Commission, Supreme Court or no Supreme Court, it is a steal plain and simple, and the business men of Klamath Falls should fight it to a finish. It is a question of principle, and they should show that they place that far above money. If the telephone company goes to the extent of taking out the phones, then Klamath Falls should install its own system and kick the Bell people out of the city.

MANY SOLDIERS AFTER LAND NOW

WASHINGTON, May 13.—With applications already received from more than 40,000 soldiers and sailors who desire to take up homesteads when discharged from military service, Secretary Lane and his advisers are revising the program originally presented to congress to take care of the increased demands.
