ANNIVERSARY OF GOLDEN SPIKE IS CELEBRATED

OGDEN, Utah, May 13.—Utah celebrated in this city Saturday the golden jubilee of the driving of the golden spike which commemorates the completion of the first transcontinental railroad connecting the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. Grizzled veterans of the West who either worked on the Central Pacific or Union Pacific, or who drove the teams that supplied the workers were the guests of honor. Many were here who remembered the race to build the Pacific Railroad, and there are some who tell of track-laying records made in the last few days of the race which would make construction engineers of today envious.

There were present a few who witnessed the driving of the last spike—made of gold—at Promontory, fifty miles east of Ogden.

Ogden was a blaze of color. Every downtown thoroughfare was ablaze with flags and only the lack of G. A. R. uniforms indicated that a re-union of war veterans was not taking place. It was a re-union, however, and the participants to a considerable extent were veterans—veterans of a battle against the desert and not of blood and battle.

Union Pacific and Southern Pacific officials were here to participate in the event, for it was their jubilee as well as that of the men who did the work. A program of entertainment was to take place during the day. A monster procession wound its way thru the city, in which were a series of allegorical floats depicting the building of the railroads and the progress of the West.
