ENEMY MARINE UNITS THOUGHT BEING UNITED

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY OF OCCUPATION—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—In the opinion of American army officers who follow day by day the process of demobilization and re-education of enemy forces it appears likely that General von Lettow-Vorbeck, the German commander who returned to Germany in March from Africa, is rapidly uniting under his command all the loyal marine units.

Writing in the summary of intelligence of the Third United States Army of recent date, one of the American experts who specializes upon the movements of all German armed forces, says: "Such a division (marines) may be expected to be one of the most powerful instruments of the present government and might even be a reactionary power."

Owing to the popular appreciation of the services of the marines during the war and to the initiation of the revolution last November by marines, numerous marine volunteer units have appeared in Germany during the past few months seeking to capitalize the popularity. So many of them, however, developed into rubber bands composed of men in marine uniforms who never served in the marine service that of late the average German civilians have begun to look upon any man in a marine uniform as a probable thief.

During the past few weeks the status of the marine units has been clearing up and from information gathered by the Third Army officers it is now possible to give a general idea of the marine units. In an article in the summary of intelligence issued daily by the Third Army one of the American officers says:

"The marine units of the Spartacist or doubtful leanings may be considered first. The most important of these is the Volkmarine division which went over to the Spartacists in the January and March troubles in Berlin, but has now been suppressed in Berlin. However, it has a branch in Braunschweig of clearly Spartacist purposes. Many who were

prominent in the dissolved unit in Berlin are now in this unit, which appears to be the foundation of the present Spartacist control of Braunschweig. At least two Home Guard units of marines are known, one at Munich and one at Frankfurt on Main. Neither of these has been fairly tried, but both are unquestionably of strong Spartacist leanings.

Supporting Minister of War Hoske and the present government are several marine units of excellent morale, which appear all or nearly all to be in the process of uniting at the present time, under control of General von Lettow-Vorbeck, the German commander who returned from Africa in March.

Most important of these is the 'Green Marine Brigade' or Marine Brigade Rohden, under Colonel von Rohden. This was organized in Kiel, offered exclusively by officers of at least 15 years' service. It suppressed disorders early this year in Bremen, Rosthaven, Wilhelmshaven and Emden and had a large part in the restoration of order in Berlin, especially at Lichtenberg, in March."

YANKEE WIRE IN FRANCE WOULD BALE THE GLOBE

WASHINGTON, May 13—Official reports on Signal Corps equipment for the war, made public today, show the same special form of telephone wire, unknown to commercial use before the war, was being turned out at the rate of 20,000 miles a month at a cost of nearly \$6,000,000 when the armistice was signed.

The American telegraph and telephone system in France totaled 96,000 miles when the fighting ended, this being the semi-permanent installations. When fighting was at its peak, the corps was approximating the use of 68,000 miles of outpost wire a month in addition, one development of the war being the necessity for two wire circuits for front line operations to prevent the enemy from "listening" in on the old style single wire equipment. Wire wastage was enormous, as it had to be abandoned whenever an advance was made.

There had been set up in France last November 252 American telephone exchanges with 14,956 lines reaching 8,959 stations. Even the telephone instruments used were of special design, combining both telephonic and telegraphic communication and the production of these in the quantity needed was a problem in itself.

At the close of hostilities the United States had 133 fully equipped telegraph stations in France, which were handling a daily average of 41,845 messages of 60 words each during the last days of the fighting, or within about 5000 of the peak load. An instance of the enormous demand that developed for field glasses, lenses of which before the war were largely obtained from Germany, lies in the work of the Bausch and Lomb Co. of Rochester, N. Y., which beginning with a capacity of 1800 pairs of field glasses a year in 1914 had reached an output of 3500 pairs a week by November, 1918, and was adding toward an output of 5500 pairs a week by January, 1919. Similar expansions of facilities were necessary in many other plants. The re-education of the forces in France for the six power artillery glass alone was approximately 4,000,000 pairs and 100,000 pairs were shipped from the United States.

The report devotes considerable space to discussion of the progress made in motion picture photography during the war. By those means, it is pointed out, the Signal Corps has created "a new kind of history of the war," a history written entirely in pictures for future generations to see.

Carrier pigeons, never before employed extensively in the American army, were widely used in France. More than 15,000 were purchased and trained for that service and the report adds that "in actual use on the field the pigeons delivered more than 95 per cent of the messages entrusted to them, flying safely thru the heaviest shell and gas barrage."
