ROOSEVELT ROAD WILL HELP EAST OREGON GREATLY

Though it is a fact not generally known, Tillamook County, the most productive dairying section of the State of Oregon, has to ship in hay and other forage for its dairy herds. On this account farmers of Eastern Oregon profited to the extent of \$100,000, in 1918. While the Tillamook section and the coast country in general boast as fertile soil as can be found anywhere the grasses grown there are not converted into winter fodder for the reason that the product is more valuable for grazing dairy cattle.

Tillamook County was not the only coast county that proved to be a good customer of the alfalfa raised on the irrigated lands of eastern Oregon. All the rest of the seven coast counties purchased hay as well, though in smaller quantities.

The proposed Roosevelt highway along the coast would open up a great agricultural empire in that region, and in a few years millions of dollars would flow out to the hay producers where now only hundreds of thousands are spent by the dairymen.

In 1918 Tillamook County sold throughout the United States \$2,000,000 worth of cheese and dairy products alone. This gives an inkling of what will be the result if millions of acres of land like that in Tillamook are opened up to cultivation and settlement thru the medium of the Roosevelt highway. Based on what has been shown in Tillamook County, \$100,000,000 worth of taxable property would be added to the coast region is developed in like manner.

Grass is green every day of the year on the ocean side of the Coast range of mountains, and the climate is so mild that cattle do not need to be kept in barns and fed, as in other dairy sections of the United States, notably in the middle west and on the Atlantic seaboard, but, as has been stated already, it has been found more profitable to keep the land sowed down to clover pasturage for the dairy herds than to raise hay thereon. That is why the coast country will always be a great market for eastern Oregon hay.

WEDDING RINGS IN DEMAND.

NEW YORK, May 14—Jewelers report large orders for wedding rings from all over the country, presumably to supply the market for June brides. One manufacturer declared the demand for plain gold bands far exceeds that for carved rings. He said his company sells 200 rings a day and of these only 75 or 100 are of the carved variety. All branches of the jewelry trade are working to capacity, with the demand from retailers greatly in excess of the facilities to turn out the work. From all sections of the country it is reported, retailers are calling for the better grade of jewelry, with cheap and shoddy merchandise receiving little attention.

HINDUS SLYLY DISAPPEARING AT IMPERIAL

EL CENTRO, Cal. May 14.—Hindus of Hindus who have been employed picking cotton and at other tasks on Imperial Valley farms have mysteriously disappeared. Several large colonies have been depleted and the few remaining Asiatics are those who hold land leases which do not expire for several months.

Observers of conditions in the valley believe the concerted exodus was the result of orders transmitted by native priests who have labored among the Hindus for several months past. A score of laborers are known to have departed for jobs in the Salt River Valley in Arizona but the destination of others who left or the reason for the hegrira is unknown.

Several months ago, local residents say, a native priest appeared in the Hindu colonies here and at Imperial, Cal. These priests held services for their countrymen, which they told valley people were for the purpose of teaching them Americanism. They soon disappeared, quietly and without any announced destination.

Soon the Hindus in the valley, even those who could read no English, started purchasing copies of a coast daily newspaper. Often as many as 300 copies of this paper would be sold in one day, where the market before never exceeded ten. As suddenly as the buying started, it stopped and the hegrira commenced.

That a cryptic message of some sort was conveyed through this daily newspaper, advising the Hindus to leave the valley, or perhaps calling them to work where they would be paid higher wages, is the only theory advanced for their strange action.

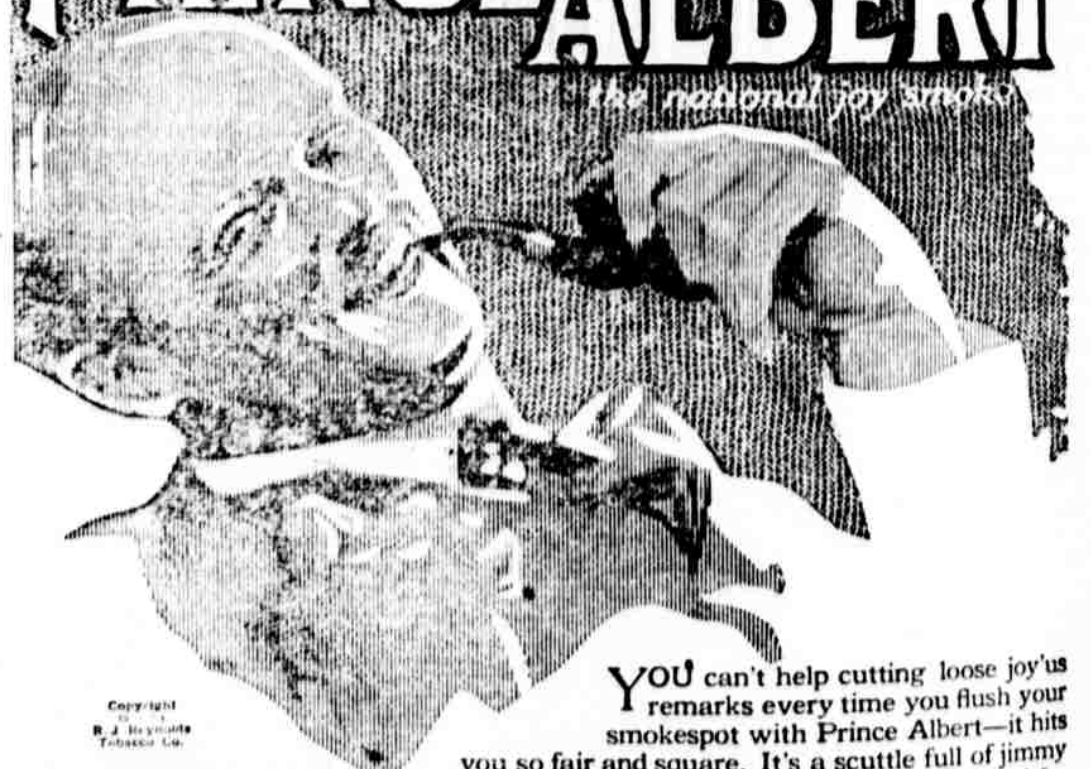
