FORD SUES CHICAGO TRIBUNE FOR LIBEL

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., May 15.—Henry Ford's million dollar libel suit against the Chicago Tribune, which was first brought in 1916, opened in circuit court here Monday, Judge J. G. Tucker presiding.

The suit was entered when the Tribune, in an editorial, referred to Ford as an anarchist because of Ford's stand on military preparedness during the Mexican border trouble.

Action was first brought in federal court at Chicago, but later was deferred and brought into the Michigan court. Both sides have engaged high legal talent to represent them.

It is expected three weeks will be necessary for a final selection of the jury. The trial itself will extend over two months it is believed.

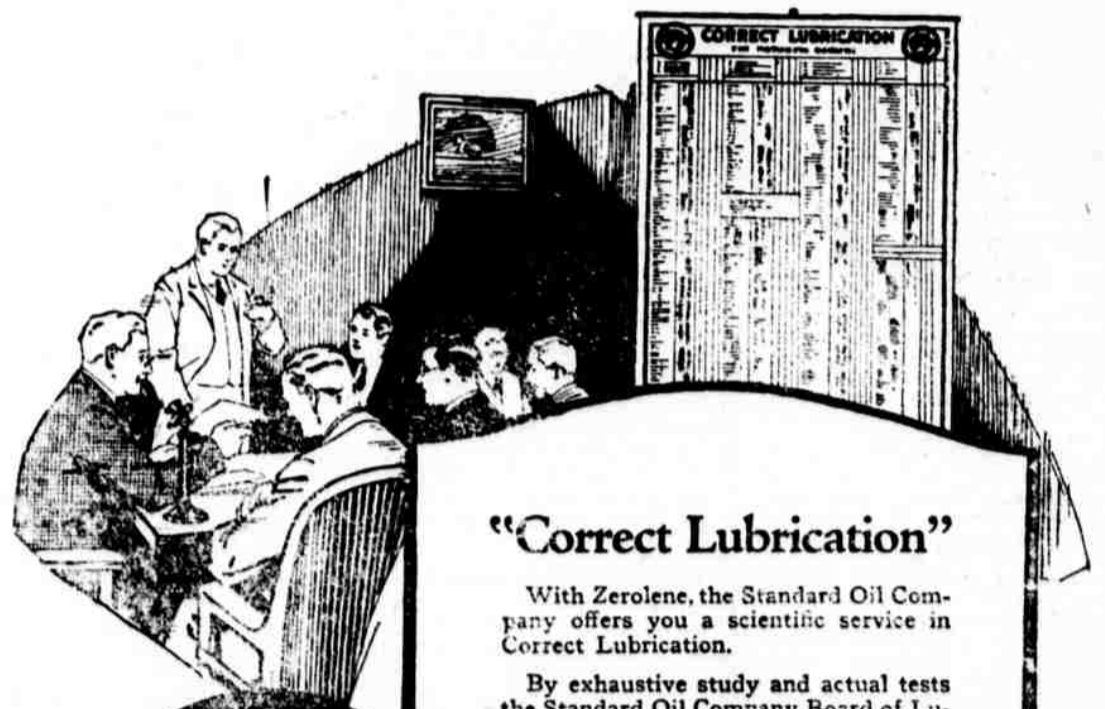
