

STATE PROJECTS ARE APPROVED IN WASHINGTON

SALEM, May 21.—Forest road projects in Oregon, embracing roads in every part of the state and costing a total of \$704,000, have been approved by the United States department of agriculture, according to word which has been received by the state highway commission.

Under the federal law governing the building of forest roads, the state must bear one-half the cost of each project. In some instances the counties in which the roads are located must pay a small portion of the cost of construction and maintenance. Five roads projects approved are:

Florence project in the Siuslaw national forest in Lane county, 15.7 miles, total estimated cost \$13,000.

Gheen project in Ocoee national forest, Wheeler county, 4.8 miles, total estimated cost \$49,000.

Hays hill road in Siskiyou national forest, Jackson county 2.4 miles, cost \$2,500.

Medford Klamath Falls project, Crater Lake national park, 22.2 miles, total estimated cost, \$246,000. Mackenzie highway in Cascade and Deschutes national forests, 53.8 miles, total estimated cost, \$355,500.

AMERICA OFFERED TURKISH CAPITAL

PARIS, May 21.—The council of four has agreed on most of the mandates for the former Turkish empire and it is understood that the United States has been offered Constantinople and Armenia with Great Britain getting Mesopotamia and Palestine, France being the mandatory for Syria and Cilicia, Italy for Adalia and Greece for Smyrna. The sultan of Turkey would be given territory in central Asia Minor with a capital probably at Brusa.
