THE RAILROAD VOTE.

The people of Klamath Falls will have no reason to regret the result of yesterday's election. The disposal of the Municipal line means that there is to be centered here one of the biggest railroad developments ever undertaken on the Coast, and it is sure to result in making Klamath Falls one of the important cities in the west. These statements can be made now without fear of being classed as propaganda. The Municipal line is the beginning of great things, and unless some national calamity occurs we will always look upon yesterday as the turning point in the upbuilding of this city.

No matter how we feel about the wisdom of ever having embarked on the railroad enterprise, the decision of the people yesterday was the right thing to do. It removed the last barrier to the completion of the road to Sprague river, and when it reaches that point, this city will begin to realize on its investment, and the cost, big as it looks now, will sink into insignificance.

NOW FOR THE HIGHWAY BONDS

The next thing the people of this county will have to turn their attention to is the voting of the highway bonds, which will be up for their consideration at the election on June 3rd. There is no doubt but that the people will vote to bond the county up to two per cent of its assessed valuation, but do not let us take any chances. Let the vote be as overwhelming as it was to sell the Municipal railroad. Let it be a record vote. Every man and woman who has a vote should be at the polls on June 3rd and by casting their ballots for the bonds let it be known that they are not only in favor of the bond issue, but that they are in favor of permanent highways. Thruout the state the counties are voting bonds by an almost unanimous vote. The success of these issues has attracted attention to the various sections acting on them. Klamath County must be right up in the front with these other counties. It should be in the lead. Klamath County was responsible for the constitutional amendment to permit the voting of bonds up to six per cent of the assessed valuation, and since that honor belongs to our county, let us add another laurel by voting for the first issue unanimously.

Everyone should constitute himself or herself a committee of one to see that the vote is gotten out and that every vote cast is a favorable one. Let us make Klamath County and Good Roads synonymous.

REPAIRS ON UPPER LAKE DIKE MADE
