S. P. OFFICERS LOGIC SOUNDS RATHER FUNNY

The following editorial from the Oregon Journal commenting on the attitude of Julius Kruttschnitt of the Southern Pacific Company will be found interesting.

Julius Kruttschnitt scores the railroad administration for buying cars in war time. He says his company was forced to supply money for new freight cars when it already had "a large number of idle cars."

Where was that "large number of idle cars" when the Oregon public service commission was recently demanding of Mr. Kruttschnitt's company, the Southern Pacific, that it remove the freight car shortage in Oregon?

Where was that "large number of idle cars" when Willamette valley sawmills were closed down, hundreds of mill employees and loggers thrown into idleness and many industries stagnant because the Southern Pacific could not supply enough freight cars to handle the traffic?

Mr. Kruttschnitt's wrath was poured out because the people of Newport, Oregon asked that about one mile of track be built so trains now operated to Yaquina City could be sent direct into their city, and because the people of the Klamath country are appealing to the railroad administration to complete the Naron cut-off.

Both requests ought to be granted. But Mr. Kruttschnitt's violent wrath related above shows the shallow excuses on which construction will be denied.

The real reasons for the refusal are the millions of money wasted in such financial tragedies as two tracks side by side up the Deschutes canyon and similar crimes of cunning that brought the railroads into their present plight.

BIG STRIKE AT LOS ANGELES ON

LOS ANGELES, May 27.—Union employees of all crafts of the Los Angeles Ship Building Company at San Pedro have been called out on a strike today. Six thousand men are affected.

It is claimed that the employers have discriminated against the Union men in cutting down their force.

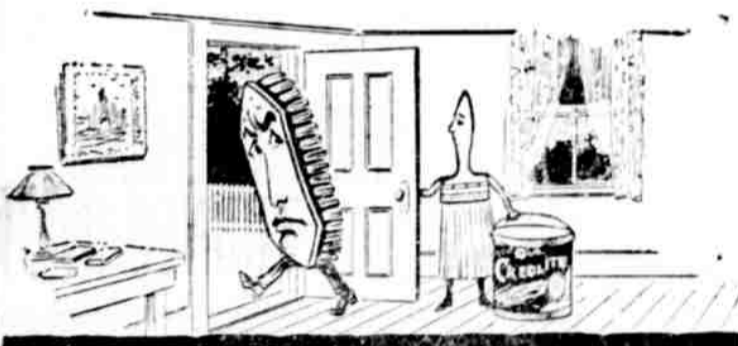
