

MEXICAN DOGS REVERT
TO SAVAGERY STATE.

PHOENIX, Arizona, May 26.—Harmless Mexican dogs, accustomed to their owners who have fed them their meat, made of the Mexican border, have reverted to their savage state, now at night, jumping out of wolves and are preying on the cattle of the Arizona ranches, and unless the situation be made good, M. E. MacCoy, special agent in charge of the United States Indian and Game Service, said yesterday that a strenuous drive had just been inaugurated to wipe out this menace to the cattle.

NO MERCY WILL BE ALLOWED TO HUN CRIMINALS

Local officials of the German government have voted to execute 1000 German prisoners held in Klamath Falls, Oregon, in accordance with the law of the land. The condemned are accused of being members of the Red Guard, the socialist movement, and who also may be guilty of acts of terrorism, can not be released and repatriated until amnesty or peace is signed, but must serve out their sentences, regardless of their German citizenship.

This, in substance, is the allied reply to a note from the German peace delegation requesting the repatriation of such prisoners at the earliest moment.

Bernard Clemenceau, who, as head of the peace conference, answered Count Von Brockdorff-Rantzau's note, pointed as an example to the case of a German prisoner shot killed in cold blood by a farmer and his wife on whose farm he had been put to work. This prisoner was sentenced to death by a court martial.

Execution was suspended till the signing of peace, in accordance with the Berne convention. But this murderer must die for his deed, peace or no peace, the French premier explained in his reply, for to reprove him upon the conclusion of peace would be contrary to the due and necessary course of justice.

Bernard Clemenceau made it clear that the laws violated by Germans now imprisoned or interned for criminal or penal offenses are the laws of the countries that hold them and that there can be no question of these laws being suspended just because peace is signed, if and when it is signed.

LEAK IN WILSON DECISION CLAIMED

NEW YORK, May 27.—Secretary Tumulty and Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, were accused of giving advance "tips" to the liquor interests that President Wilson would ask congress to repeal the wartime prohibition act, in a statement issued by William H. Anderson, state superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league of New York.

"The hotel men had to 'spill' the fact that Mr. Tumulty, the president's secretary, had given them assurance of help from him," said Anderson. "The brewers could not hold themselves and violated Gompers' confidence respecting the assurance from the president he had brought back from Europe.

The least that the wets could have done in return for what the president was doing for them was to keep their mouths shut. Instead, see what they did."
