## JAPANESE ACTS IN KOREA SAID MOST INHUMANE

PEKING. (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—The Reverend Edward W. Thwing, oriental secretary of the International Reform Bureau, who was in Korea in March and personally witnessed some of the disturbances resulting from the Korean Independence Movement, declares that "the lower Japanese officials and soldiers have acted like lawless savages in dealing with this peculiar situation." The movement in Korea is described by the Reverend Thwing, who formerly was an American missionary as "a peaceful revolt which should have been handled with the greatest of tact."

"In a remarkable manner," he said to The Associated Press, "the Korean Independence Movement has manifested skill, courage and organization that has been a great surprise to many. It has shown, more than ever before, how unreasonable, without justice, cruel and brutal the military rule of Japan is in this land. I could hardly believe these things if I had not seen them with my own eyes."

"The police and soldiers have arrested old men and little children and cruelly beaten them. Little girls of only ten years of age, women and school girls have been shamefully treated and subjected to physical punishment and torture for no other crime than shouting with peaceful enthusiasm for their own country."

and crying out for the independence which Japan had guaranteed by solemn treaties.

"These things have been witnessed not by one or two but by scores of missionaries and others in many parts of Korea during March. If the world could only know these things they would certainly heed this cry of distress from an oppressed people. But the Japanese are doing all they can to keep the world from knowing the truth. A report has just come that in one city, from which letters have been sent, they are making it very hard for the missionaries, even hinting at deportation, unless they stop telling out the truth."

## UKRAINE GETS MUCH DISEASE FROM RUSSIA

STANISLAU, Ukraine. (Correspondence of The Associated Press)—Diseases imported from Russia by the way of Kiev and Odessa are spreading to such an alarming extent that the government has closed the frontiers and closely examined civil refugees and other former prisoners of war returning to their homes. An investigation by the International Red Cross Mission shows that possibly twenty-five percent of the population of Lemberg and other centers of Old Galicia are infected by the various forms of typhus, dysentery, tuberculosis or other infectious or mental and nervous diseases.

The conditions are considered worse here owing to closer contact with Russia. In one hospital here are 500 cases of typhus and 600 cases of social diseases. For a population of 5,000,000 there are but sixty physicians. Thus far six doctors have died of typhus and three others are ill. The condition is made worse by lack of soaps, disinfectants, change of clothing and sheets. Virtually all the window curtains have been requisitioned for use as bed clothing or for making women's underclothes.

Of a total of 250 drug stores, 200 are without drugs. In the hospitals all kinds of cases are treated in the same ward.

These diseases are spreading partly from Russia where it is affirmed that the Red Army is contaminated with social disease to the extent of seventy percent. Many diseases also were spread by Russian prisoners who were interned in Hungary and who have returned to Russia since the armistice was signed. Many of these were in a horrible condition. When set free by the authorities and told to go home, they crowded the trains in such numbers and under such conditions that thousands died of hunger and illness on the way. One trainload stopped here and discharged 300 dead. More than 3,000 such unfortunates now have been buried here.

In one week there arrived at Kiev trains freighted with 600 dead. The diseases are spread partly by vermin. Lack of food is making conditions worse. There is no coffee. Tea costs \$8 a pound, bread fifty cents a pound, sugar \$1 a pound and coal, wood and soap are so high that it cost fifty cents a pound, sugar \$1 a pound and coal, wood and soap are so high that it costs fifty cents to laundry one shirt.
