## WILSON WANTS GOAL CONTROL

WASHINGTON, May 27. President Wilson is expected to present to congress, on his return, a program which will provide for "government association" in the production of coal, oil and gas resources, according to reports here today.

His plan is not one of outright government ownership, it was said, but one which contemplated a supervision and direction which will make impossible privately owned monopolies of these natural resources. For some time Dr. Harry A. Garfield, former fuel administrator, has been working out a plan for the president and it may have been presented to him by this time.

The purpose, it is understood, would be to secure a more equitable distribution of these necessities of industrial life and eliminate the capitalistic dictatorship which heretofore has been in effect.
