TWO ELECTIONS IN ONE.

The people of Klamath county must not overlook the fact that there are virtually two elections in one on June 3rd. This is due to the voting of bonds for the construction of highways, the attorneys for the bond buyers contending that to be absolutely sure of the legality of the bonds, it will be necessary to vote for them at a special election. In order to meet this requirement, the county court called a special election on June 3rd. It will be held at the same time, same place and with the on that date, but there will be two same officers as the general election on that date, but there will be two ballots instead of one—one for state ing question.

Special attention should be paid to this fact by the voters, so that they will know the necessity of voting on each question separately.

In view of the fact that no particular attention has been paid to the matter of voting these bonds, little if any interest has been aroused on this important question. There is no doubt as to success of the issue, but this certainty must cause no trouble on the part of the voter. It is essential that every vote that can possibly be cast for the bonds be secured, for the reason that we want to be able to go to the Highway Commission with the practically unanimous vote of the county and use it as an argument to secure every cent of money we can possibly squeeze out of it. The vote should be an indication of the voter that he wants good roads; that he is interested enough to get out and vote to raise the money to build them; that he is going to watch how the work is done and what it is costing and that he is not going to stand for the same profligacy and incompetency that has marked the construction of the Klamath Irrigation Project.

This election is the most important event in the history of Klamath county. We have no hesitancy in saying that if this county is seamed with properly constructed highways, that every acre of land will double in value. That the increased assessment roll will make the cost to prevent heavy taxpayers nothing, for it will make available for taxation the property that today is practically worthless.

We were in hopes that public meetings would be held thruout the county, at which would be discussed the problems of good roads—not the necessity for them, for everyone knows this—but the question of their construction, their location, the cost, all things connected with a program that must of necessity extend over a period of five or more years and will cost five or more millions of dollars. But since this has not been possible, The Herald hopes to stir the voter to a sense of duty in this matter and to impress on him that it is vital to his particular section that every vote possible be cast. The time is coming when the various sections of the county will be demanding recognition in the matter of the distribution of the money to be spent. Now is your time to get ready. Let your vote show your interest and then when you go before the county court and the Highway Commission you will be in a position where you can say "Every voter in our precinct voted at the special election." Vote, whether you are for or against the bonds. Show that you are interested in the question of roads. We hope that you will vote for the bonds, but we are just as anxious that you go on record one way or the other. Then will the officials know what the people of the county think and demand in the matter of good roads.

And don't forget that you must have a special ballot for the bond question.
