IN A MOVING WORLD AND TIME

The Oregonian will record itself as frankly surprised at the evident favor with which the proposal for the Roosevelt highway is received by the state

Perhaps the name has something to do with it. We think it has

Perhaps there is a feeling that, in the widespread road movement throughout Oregon, the coast counties have been in a measure neglected

Perhaps there is an underlying apprehension of our almost defenseless situation, and a real appreciation of the military value of an accessible and practicable thoroughfare, parallel to the coast line and very near to it

Perhaps there is a willingness now to invest in roads for purposes of development, with an assurance that the returns will be certain, and with the knowledge that they will be slight to hint some matured project of self-help

Perhaps the vision of the state has been conditioned and enlarged that it wants a comprehensive plan of road construction proposed now and realized as soon as may be, so that the whole may benefit by the progress and prosperity of every part

Perhaps the plan of co-operation with the government contains its own peculiar appeal just now to citizens who have had recently a great stimulus to their patriotic ardor thru the recollection of a great war, and have earned a higher pride in their government, their state and their citizenship than ever before

Perhaps it is all these considerations together, and others of merit and influence. Whatever it is, it is quite true that practically every representative voice in Oregon, so far as it has spoken, is for the Roosevelt highway

Let us be glad that it is so. Some times a qualm of uneasiness overwhelms some of us that we may be overdoing this road business. Yet we have had a long spell where it has been underdone, or not at all. The present is great and the future is long, and there is plenty of time and resource to pay

Klamath Falls, Oregon, April 29, 1919.—The undersigned will receive bids at the office of the Reclamation Service, Klamath Falls, Oregon, until two o'clock p. m., June 5, 1919, when the same will be publicly opened, for the reclaiming of about 7,000 acres of swamp land in Crystal Creek Marsh; 1,000 acres in Hank's Marsh, and 1980 acres in Pelican Bay Marsh, Upper Klamath Lake, Oregon, within the Klamath Project. No rental will be exacted for the use of the land; but the successful bidder will be required to begin work within six months from the date of the contract; to complete the work within three years from said date, and to give bond in the sum of \$10,000.00 for the reclamation of the Crystal Creek Marsh lands; a bond of \$10,000.00 for the reclamation of the Hank's Marsh lands, and a bond of \$20,000.00 for the reclamation of the Pelican Bay Marsh lands; said bonds to be with an acceptable Surety company as surety, conditioned for a faithful compliance with the terms and provisions of the respective contracts. Bidders may submit proposals for any or all three tracts but in awarding the contract each tract will be considered as a separate unit. Each bidder must state the shortest period of time for which he will accept the use of the land as a consideration for reclaiming it, which period will be considered in awarding the contract. 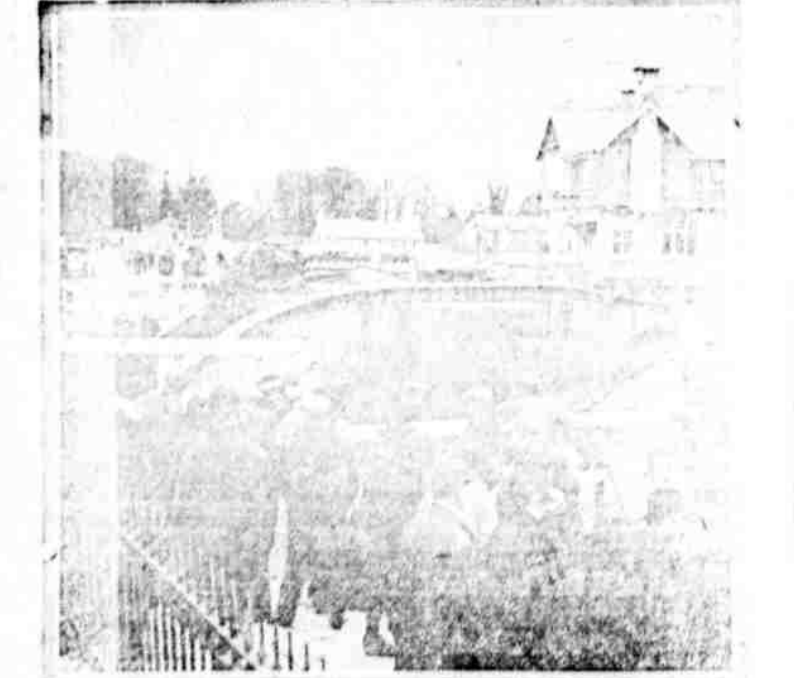
