

YANKEE HEROS HONORED TODAY

AMERICANS WHO MADE THE SUPREME SACRIFICE ARE HONORED BY WILSON AND FORSHING NEAR BATTLE FIELDS WHERE THEY DIED.

PARIS, May 29.—Not a grave of any American that fell in the World War was overlooked today. Some services were held in the vicinity of the battle lines along which the troops gave their lives.

President Wilson made an address at the American cemetery at Senones, near Paris.

General Forshing went to Romagne near where the Americans suffered their heaviest losses.

The President in his speech at Senones declared that the day of Secret Councils is past because the people are in the saddle. Private Councils of the Statesmen will no longer determine the destinies of nations, he said.

He made an earnest defense of the League of Nations and said he looked forward to the time when a man who failed to support the League would be classed with the man who opposed the union of the States after the Civil War.

LOGGING CONGRESS INTEREST HERE IN

Considerable interest is being manifested by the local lumbermen in the Tenth Session of the Pacific Logging Congress which is to be held in Portland from October 8 to 11, according to Editor George Cornwall of the Timberman, who is here for a short time, conferring with the different manufacturers and gathering material for his enterprising publication.

at this meeting will be the application of the caterpillar tractor to logging operation.

E. W. Elfordahl, one of the officials of the Modoc Lumber company near Chiloquin, a well informed lumberman, will introduce a paper on logging pine timber on steep grades.

W. W. Bead, superintendent of logging at the Hammond Lumber company of Eureka, California, is president of the congress and Mr. Cornwall is secretary.

GOLDSTEIN MUST SERVE THREE YEARS IN PRISON.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 30.—Sentence of three years' imprisonment of Robert Goldstein, Los Angeles motion picture producer, for violating the espionage act in the making and presentation of a film entitled "The Spirit of 1776," has been affirmed today by the United States circuit court of appeals. The objectionable feature of the film was depiction of English troops bayoneting American children and ill acts. The original sentence of Goldstein to ten years' imprisonment was commuted by President Wilson to a term of three years.

RUTH LAW PLANS OVERSEAS FLIGHT

CHICAGO, May 30.—Ruth Law, avatrix, announced here today that she plans to attempt a transatlantic flight within six weeks.

She will use a new Curtiss land biplane equipped with two Curtiss-

Kirkham motors of 400 horsepower each and will be accompanied by Jay Lambert, her mechanic. She expects the United States navy to give her assistance.

The first attempt to fly across the ocean is the first transatlantic flight since the first flight across the Atlantic in 1911. It is expected that she will arrive in Europe in about a month.

DAYTON, Ohio, May 30.—Howard Crosby, experimental aviator for the Dayton Wright Airplane company, is awaiting authority from the president of the company before he puts the final touches on his plane for an attempt to cross the Atlantic alone in a de Havilland Four across the Atlantic in a type made here and flown in France by American aviators.
