THE RECONSTRUCTION BONDS.

It is well, perhaps, to repeat the statement that there is but one bond issue of \$5,000,000 for reconstruction purposes proposed in the measures on next Tuesday's ballot.

There are two measures, however, which mention the one bond issue. One is a constitutional amendment, the other a bill. The constitutional amendment appropriates no money, and, standing alone, authorizes no bond issue. It is but a grant of authority to enact the bill which appears farther down on the ballot.

The reconstruction bonding bill authorizes the bond issue of \$5,000,000. The amendment (306 yes) and the bill (312 yes) go together. Adoption of one and defeat of the other will accomplish nothing. Adoption of both will authorize issuance of \$5,000,000 in bonds, no more.

It will also bear repetition that the bill and amendment have three main purposes. The bonds if authorized will be apportioned as follows:

For co-operation with the government in land reclamation, \$2,000,000.

For financing the state soldiers' land settlement tract, \$647,500.

For construction of institutional buildings and armories, \$2,352,500.

The provision for co-operation with the government is anticipatory legislation. A congressional act must be passed before this portion of the bond issue can be utilized. If used the government will match the state's \$2,000,000, thus providing \$4,000,000 for land reclamation in Oregon.

The building allotment of \$2,352,500 is not for promoting a fixed building program, although the fund is apportioned among several institutions. The act enjoins the board of control to have due regard for unemployment conditions. It is announced that unless an immediate need can be shown for any building, that work will not be undertaken unless there is a labor crisis.

It is not venturesome for a state as prosperous as Oregon to pledge \$5,000,000 for enterprises so worthy. Nor is it a mark of undue caution to prepare for a possible unemployment emergency. Adoption of amendment and bill will at once perform a public duty toward the soldiers, sailors and marines of Oregon and serve the public itself—Oregonian.

VOTE THE BONDS.

Tomorrow the people of the county will be called upon to decide the fate of the road construction program of this county. If they decide in favor of issuing bonds for the construction of permanent roads, then Klamath county will immediately take her place among the leading counties of the state, for the live counties of Oregon are joining the ranks of the good roads enthusiasts and voting bonds for carrying thru the big road program outlined by the Highway commission. The voting of the bonds will mean that there will be brought into Klamath county three dollars of state and government money for every dollar we spend. It will also mean that the increased values by reason of new highways will be sufficient to absorb the additional taxes, so that the present rate will never be raised and more than likely it will be lowered.

In addition to voting the bonds, the people of the county should vote favorably on every reconstruction measure that is being submitted for their approval. Not one of them but has the indorsement of the thinking men of the state. Two in particular that are deserving of your consideration are the Roosevelt highway and the granting to the state of authority to get back of the irrigation bonds. Equally as important is the amendment to the constitution permitting counties to vote bonds for roads up to six per cent of their assessed value.

This will enable Klamath county to get every dollar of state and government funds to which it is entitled, and will bring to us millions of dollars that we will not have to repay and which will go elsewhere if this amendment fails. You will be safe and sane if you vote affirmatively on every one of the reconstruction measures. It will mean a new era for Klamath county.
