NEW SCHOOL FOR MILLS ADDITION

The contract for the new school building for the Mills Addition was awarded by the Directors of School District No. 1 to Snook and Travers of Albany, Oregon, the bid of this firm being the lowest. The amount of the bid was \$12,000. G. A. Lorenz of this city was awarded the contract for the heating and plumbing. Both awards were made subject to the results of the bond election to be held on June 5, when the people will be asked to vote \$6,000 additional for the construction of this building.

The necessity for a school building for the Mills addition is apparent to anyone who will give the matter the slightest consideration. The population of this section of the city has had a phenomenal growth, and is constantly increasing and promises to be one of the most thickly settled portions of the city. Already ground has been purchased for the site, the purchase price being remarkably low. Fifteen thousand dollars in bonds has already been voted, but owing to the great advance in the cost of everything entering into the construction of the building, it was impossible to secure bids within the limit of the funds on hand, so it was decided to ask for more money. This will undoubtedly be voted.

MYSTERY SURROUNDS PASTOR'S DISAPPEARANCE

CORVALLIS, June 4.—The statement of the official board of the Christian church of this city in the matter of the alleged drowning of the minister, Rev. J. Cronenberg, has again been delayed by the receipt of evidence in the case which the board is not prepared to announce.

It is learned on reliable authority that this is the second time the pastor has mysteriously disappeared from home. The first time he was gone for several years, then reappeared and was accepted by his family. While away, it was said, he was under an assumed name.

Members of the board have given out the impression that the statement would indicate that the minister was laboring under temporary mental derangement. No information will be given out by the board, it is announced, until all evidence in the case has been examined.

ARMY OF OCCUPATION UNTIL OCTOBER ONLY

WASHINGTON, June 4.—No provisions for an army of occupation after September of this year have been made by the war department, according to testimony before the house military affairs committee. Major McKay, of the general staff, told the committee that the plans call for an army of occupation of 600,000 during July, 400,000 during August and 200,000 during September.

COPENHAGEN, June 4.—The Estonian and Finnish forces have taken Petrograd today, according to an unconfirmed dispatch from Vardo.

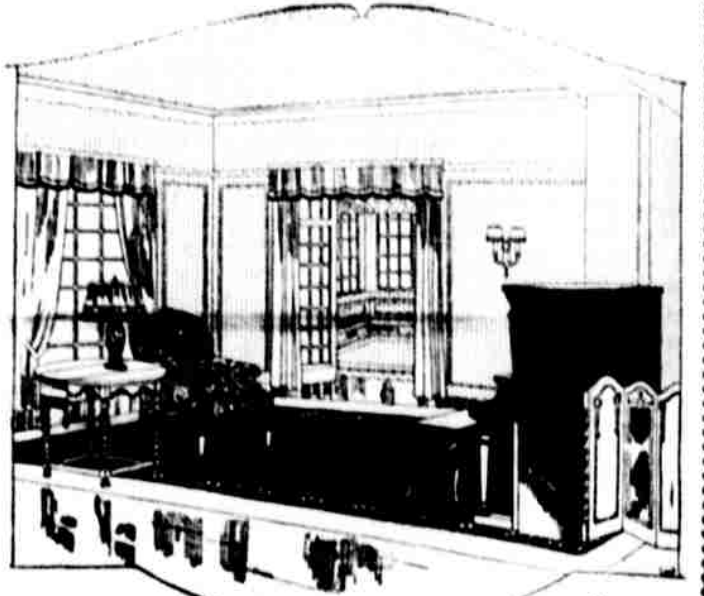
MADRAS OFFICERS FOUR OUT, BURN AND BURY MUCH BOOZE
