

# 100 MILES OF FOREST ROADS THIS SEASON

Nearly 115 miles of trail at the cost of more than \$25,000 will be constructed in Oregon national forests this summer. M. L. Merritt, forest examiner in charge of the trails, has announced.

The principal ones are Crater national forest. About 35 miles along the summit of the Cascades from Crater Lake park boundary south to Lake of the Woods, at a cost of \$2500. This is especially important for fire protection because it gives access to every one of the water sheds from the auto roads at both ends. It will also be used by grazing permittees and tourists.

Completion of the trail along the summit between the Rogue and Umpqua rivers. This will be used by grazing people as well as for fire protection.

Some work along the summit west of the Applegate river. This project, largely protective, will not be completed this summer.

Siskiyou national forest. Some money in addition to co-operation from the settlers will be spent on the Chetco river trail up the river to a group of settlements.

A crew is now working on the Rogue river trail, passing up the section near Mule Creek. This is the main thoroughfare for mail and all supplies from the East. Some money will be spent on the trail between Rogue river at Hildebrand and Powers, if co-operation expected from the settlers can be secured.

Two projects will be replaced by the west fork of Cow creek that are in bad shape on both the Siskiyou and Crater forests.

Cascade national forest. Seventeen miles will be built on the Clatsop creek trail.

The little Cow Horn trail will be extended eight miles. This leads through a heavily timbered region to a look-out station. It is proposed to develop Siskiyou national forest. Completion of the Pyramid trail.

Fourteen miles on the Volcano trail, which is partially finished. It will be used for all purposes, and especially for fire protection.

In addition, the forest service expects to construct a trail in the Columbia national forest just across the river in Washington along the north side of the Yacolt burn of 1902. This is primarily for fire protection. The present trail from Twin Butte on the trail between Tiger and Spirit lake will be extended to Lewis river.

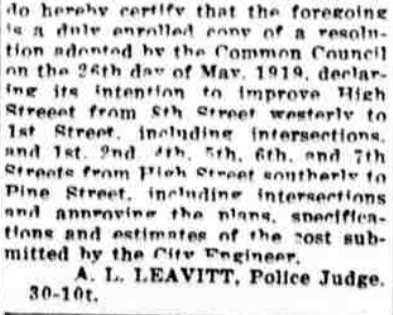
