WOULD PUT 'HOLE' IN THE NATIONAL PARK

LIVINGSTON, Mont., June 7.—Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior, according to Washington advices, is favorable to the proposal to add the Jackson Hole country to Yellowstone National Park. Congressman Mondell of Wyoming, it is stated, has engaged to pilot a bill on the subject through congress.

The proposed addition includes the Grand Teton mountains, Jackson lake and the headwaters of the Yellowstone river. The country is declared to be as wild as any in America, and although it is almost unknown to tourists, it is said to equal or surpass the present park in beauty. In the old days, it was the refuge of outlaw Indians and later of white bandits.

The area is 1,000 square miles, about one-third of that of the present park.
