HIGHWAY FOR WEST SIDE LAKE

VIEWERS ARE APPOINTED TO SELECT ROUTE FOR WHAT WILL BE PART OF BOULEVARD AROUND THE LAKE

The first step of what will lead to the construction of a boulevard entirely around the Upper Klamath lake was taken yesterday when the county court appointed W. F. Atant and R. C. Short as viewers to select and pass upon the route that is to be followed by the proposed highway for the west side of the lake.

The route proposed will start at the head of Link river, the top of the top of the proposed dam that is to be constructed by the California Oregon Power company, being one of the possibilities in connection with the project. Continuing from this point, the line will follow the border of the lake to where it will intersect the present highway to Rock Creek. This will necessitate the inclusion of the dike surrounding the Weens marsh as part of the highway.

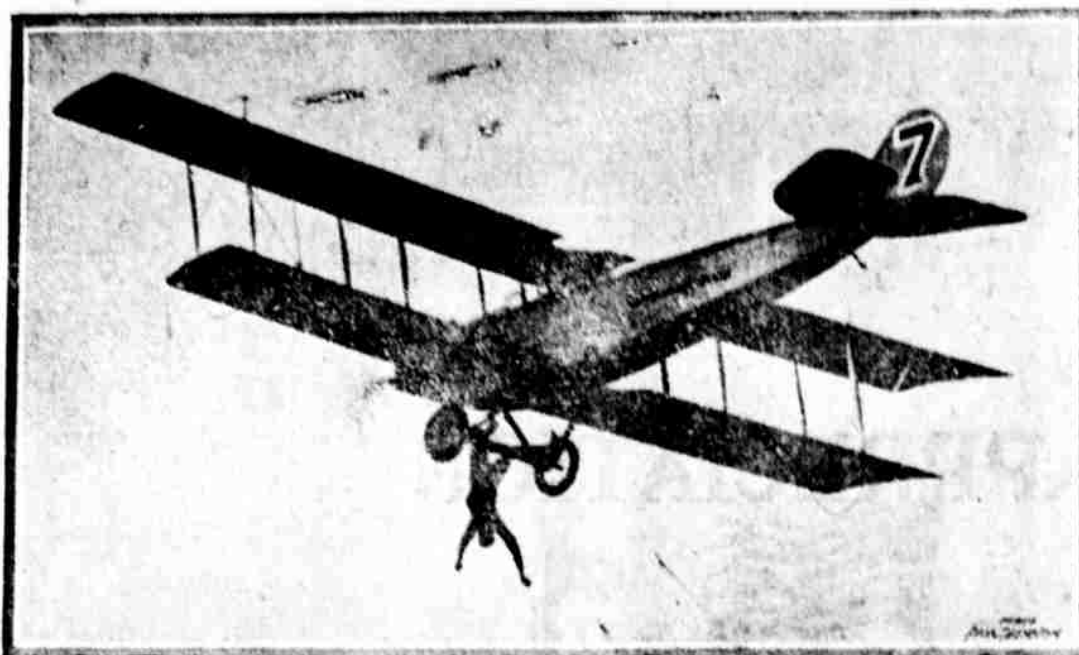
RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO CHANGE THE GRADE OF PORTIONS OF HIGH ST., FIRST ST., AND SECOND ST.

WHEREAS, the Common Council deems it expedient to change the grade of portions of High Street, First Street and Second Street; BE IT RESOLVED—That the grade of portions of said streets be changed as follows:

Table with columns: Street Name, Curb North, Curb South, Sidewalk North, Sidewalk South. Lists various street segments and their proposed grades.

Thence on a uniform grade to established grade at Sixth Street. First Street, at 20 feet north of the north line of Pine Street, from 187.0 to 189.5. First Street, at 120 feet north of the north line of Pine Street, from 206.6 to 208.5. Second Street, at 20 feet north of the north line of Pine Street, from 187.0 to 190.5. Second Street, at 120 feet north of the north line of Pine Street, from 198.0 to 204.6.

FORD PLANTS TO DOT THE EARTH

DETROIT, June 10.—Ford will dot the world with plants when peace is signed. Immediate steps will be taken for the building of assembly plants and factories in many of the foreign nations. In the larger countries there will be factories and in the smaller countries, such as Denmark, Spain and Portugal, assembly plants with an average capacity of 100 per day. The assembly plants will be the first constructed and will become the clearing houses for the parts supplied to them from the Detroit and Manchester, England, factories.

Cadix and Copenhagen have already been decided upon as cities where assembly plants will be erected, each to cost approximately \$350,000, and by this system the Ford interests expect to be able to place on the European market at least half a million cars annually. It is but a question of weeks when the Paris and Bordeaux offices of the company will be re-opened.

LONE ROBBER HOLDS UP BANK

MAY OFFER EASIER TERMS TO GERMANY'S ENTRANCE INTO LEAGUE TO FORESTALL SIMILAR ASSOCIATION BY FOES

Thoughtless dispatch by the Associated Press.—The Council of Four is now considering the proposed change in the covenant of the League of Nations, whereby the terms of Germany's admission will be made easier. The change is prompted by a desire to forestall the possible formation of another combination of nations with Russia, Germany and former allies of Germany in leading roles. An ultimatum was sent to the Hungarian government demanding that the advance into Czechoslovakia be stopped and threatening to use Allied troops to force Hungary to abandon the invasion. It is uncertain whether a treaty with Turkey will be negotiated. The Turkish delegation, enroute to France on a warship, will appear before the peace conference simply in an advisory capacity. The National convention of the majority socialist party will be held at Weimar, Germany today. It is expected to have an important bearing on government's future course regarding its foreign relations and internal affairs.
