

At the Theaters

The City Engineer pursuant to resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having on the 5th day of May 1919, filed plans, specifications and estimates of the cost of improving High Streets from 8th Street westerly to 1st Street, including intersections, and 1st, 2nd, 4th, 5th, 6th, and 7th Streets from High Street southerly to Pine Street, including intersections, and the Council all having taken the same under advisement and finding the plans, specifications and estimates to be satisfactory.

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, That the plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of High Street from 8th Street westerly to 1st Street, including intersections and 1st, 2nd, 4th, 5th, 6th, and 7th Sts. from High Street southerly to Pine Street, including intersections, be, and the same are hereby approved and.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of High Street and 1st, 2nd, 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th Streets in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates; said improvement to consist of paving said portions of said streets with oil macadam pavement at an estimated cost, including cement side walks, concrete curbing and grading, of \$52,707.00, or concrete pavement at an estimated cost, including cement side walks, concrete curbing and grading of \$69,131.00; or bituminous pavement at an estimated cost, including cement side walks, concrete curbing and grading of \$136,247.00; said improvement in either event to include grading, rolling curbing and concrete side walks 4 feet wide on both sides of said streets and.
