**HIGH PRICES ARE DECLARED HERE TO STAY**

PORTLAND, June 13.—The future of the money market and the probable course of commodity prices are perhaps the most important among the various financial problems that are the subject of considerable study and comment at the present time. So far as the general public is concerned, there is, of course, a naturally hopeful feeling that in both instances there will be a substantial decline, but whether this hope will be realized to any considerable extent appears to be somewhat problematical, at least in the near future. There has been some easing off in certain directions in commodity prices, but the best commercial opinion seems to be that there is nothing in the present outlook that warrants expectations of any material lowering in either money rates or the market value of standard commodities.

A bearing on this point has been made in the last report of the federal reserve board and the statement that "retail trade is assuming unprecedented volume, while prices continue abnormally high," is significant of the general trend of business. Commercial business heads also take the view that there is a diminishing likelihood of any general commodity price recessions and the indications are that the public will be compelled to reconcile itself to the probability that the old pre-war prices may never again be reached.

The biggest business heads of this country and some of the best economic thoughts are in line with this theory. Giving a summary of conditions, George M. Reynolds, president of the Continental and Commercial National bank of Chicago, has to say:

"There is one point about which there seems to me to be considerable misconception—that is the question of commodity prices. Undoubtedly many of those who have delayed purchases and construction work have acted upon the theory that there would be a rapid recession in prices. This seems to me to be a fallacy. Prices are much higher all over the world than ever before. Production has not kept pace with consumption, and labor is being paid more today than at any previous time in all history, so far as my knowledge goes. Money is abundant not only here, but in Europe and South America. The standard of living has been raised so that our requirements now are far ahead of what they were in former years. All this supports the theory that any price recessions that occur, except in individual industries due to special causes, will be gradual, and that the 1914 level will not be reached in many years, if ever."

**PORTLAND GETS SHRINER MEET**

ROSE CITY WINS OVER NEW ORLEANS FOR THE NINETEEN-TWENTY ANNUAL CONVENTION.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 12.—Portland was today selected over New Orleans as the city in which will be held the next convention of the Shriners. The victory was a hard won one, and the delegates from the Rose City are jubilant over the success of their efforts.

**BANKING RESOURCES GROW.**

Growth of business of banking institutions of the state of Oregon is shown by figures compiled by Will H. Bennett, state superintendent of banks, the report showing Oregon to have had 88 national banks and 176 state banks on May 12 of this year. The total, 264, is one in excess of the 191 total, and two more than the 1917 total.

The report shows that Portland's 23 banks and trust companies on the date in question had resources of \$165,221,310, or 55 1/2 per cent of the state total. Deposits were \$140,299,968 or more than 57 per cent of the state total. Loans and discounts amounted to \$78,961,862, or 53 per cent of all banks in the state.
