

GERMANY WILL UTILIZE RUSSIA JUAREZ AGAIN IS THREATENED

UCH IS THE WARNING OF AMERICAN AMBASSADOR FRANCIS IF A STABLE GOVERNMENT IS NOT ESTABLISHED.

RYE BEACH, N. H., June 13.—Warning that if a stable government is not established in Russia, Germany will utilize Russian resources and manpower and again become a great menace to the people of Europe was given today by David R. Francis, American ambassador to Russia. Mr. Francis is recuperating here from illness which compelled him to undergo a surgical operation in London on his way home from Archangel. He is awaiting orders from the State Department.

Mr. Francis was prompted to make the statement by the recent speeches of Frank A. Vanderlip, formerly president of the National City Bank of New York in which Mr. Vanderlip gave his views of the industrial situation in Europe and told America that she must be prepared to extend her credit to put European business on its feet.

"I have read with great interest," said the ambassador, "Mr. Vanderlip's note of warning delivered before the Economic Club in New York several days ago. Mr. Vanderlip had unequalled facilities for studying conditions in Europe during his four or five months' visit and his address, coming as it does from the president of the largest financial institution in America, imparts most valuable information. He is not in the diplomatic service; if he were he would have thought a second time concerning his silence about labor conditions in England. Those conditions are more or less serious in every European country and merit attention even in the United States."

The Bolshevik spirit which is now manifesting itself in the Canadian strike, I am glad to see is frowned upon by the labor unions in that country as well as in our own. If that spirit should dominate in the new world or even if it should permeate labor circles to the extent it did in Russia in the beginning of the Bolshevik Revolution, it would as it did there attempt to appropriate the lands and that would be very deleterious for the labor unions of America. Here the public domain immense as it was has practically all been taken up by settlers who own the soil they till and would not listen with any patience to the doctrine of nationalizing the land.

"Lenine has resigned this as, before I left Russia, he said Bolshevism had to cause to fear the large land owners or feudal barons as he called them, but the small holders among the peasantry were the most powerful enemies of Bolshevism."

General Angeles is believed to have about a thousand men. It is not expected that he will attack until tonight, unless the federales advance to meet him. The rebels are four miles away.

HOBO COLLEGE IS OPENED IN EAST

NEW YORK, June 13.—"Hobo college" opened its doors on the Bowery under the direction of James Eads Howe of St. Louis, the "millionaire hobo." All graduate hobos who desire post-graduate courses in such subjects as "sociology," "industrial law" and "public speaking" are invited to enroll.

Students will start the day with a two-hour job hunt. If they fail in their quest, they can return with first-hand information for a course in sociology. At 2:30 P. M. the studies will close with a "Jungle lunch," menu not provided. Mr. Howe says the college is modeled on similar successful institutions in Chicago and Cincinnati. He invites discharged soldiers to join the classes.

CATTLEMAN TO BE TRIED.

SALEM, OR., June 13.—William Z. Moss, prominent eastern Oregon cattleman, must stand trial in the circuit court of Harney county on a charge of cattle rustling. The supreme court has sustained Circuit Judge Biggs, who refused recently to dismiss an indictment returned against Moss.

Moss was convicted of the same charge in Lake county and that is now pending before the supreme court on appeal.
