

GATHERING EGGS AT DIAMOND LAKE

GAME COMMISSIONER STONE AND WARDEN STOUT FIND THAT THE WORK IS PROGRESSING SATISFACTORILY

State Game Commissioner E. F. Stone and Game Warden Henry Stout returned yesterday from Diamond Lake, where they went for the purpose of seeing what progress was being made in the gathering of trout eggs by Messrs. Ramsdale and Padgett, who for the past three weeks have been engaged in securing a supply of eggs to be used in stocking the North Umpqua river. The journey was an eventful one, the first being the first car to reach the lake this year. Little difficulty was experienced until they were within about three miles of the lake, from which point they had to practically shovel and cut their way thru. Monday night and Tuesday there was a heavy snow storm at the lake.

The work of securing the necessary eggs for stocking the North Umpqua was undertaken about three weeks ago, when Ramsdale and Padgett went to the lake. They were able to drive to within twelve miles of their destination, and it required three days for them to get their equipment and supplies the balance of the way. During the time they have been there remarkable success has attended their labors, for they have secured enough eggs to stock the streams that are today without any trout. These eggs will be hatched and the small fish will be placed in Bear and Lava creeks and Clearwater river, all tributaries of the North Umpqua.

Mr. Stone states that bear are very plentiful at the lake, many tracks being seen within twenty feet of his tent. Ramsdale and Padgett say that it is a common occurrence to see bear, the feed for them being quite plentiful in the vicinity of the lake.

SOLDIER LAND BILL OPPOSED BY GRANGE

WASHINGTON, June 11.—Opening of an office by the National Grange in Washington within the last week to oppose the passage of the act to provide homes for returning soldiers, sailors and marines is the biggest surprise that has hit congress and the capital in a long time.

When the plan to provide homes for soldiers on arid, swamp and cinder lands was first proposed, and for a long time after, it was taken for granted that the country would be practically unanimous for such a measure.

Imagine the surprise of the public lands committee of the house, presided over by Representative Slinnot of Oregon, the other morning when T. C. Atkeson of West Virginia, legislative representative for the Grange in this city, same bolting in and asked for a hearing.

Atkeson announced that the National Grange was against the bill and proposed making a fight to defeat it on the ground that it will set up new competition for the farmers already engaged in food production. He called the bill a plot to put the government behind a scheme in competition with the farmers and declares it a conspiracy, or words to that effect, of western representatives in congress to reclaim vast barren areas in their home districts.

Asked whom he represented, Atkeson said he represented "1,000,000 every-day working farmers from Maine to California," a statement which has been repudiated by some of the representatives in congress from California, who declare that Atkeson does not even represent the Grange of California. Representatives from other western states also declare that this action has been taken without consulting either their farmers or their Grangers.

There is much agitation on the question of cheaper food in this country and everybody wants everybody to go back to the farm except himself," Atkeson asserted. "We farmers have got just a little nauseated with that attitude in the public mind. We are confronted with the condition that eight hours a day and \$1 an

hour means \$6 wheat and I defy any man on any farm to produce it for less on that basis.
