U. S. BUILT MORE SHIPS THAN ENGLAND

LONDON, May 15. (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—The United States was building on March 31 twice as much shipping as was Great Britain, according to the figures given by Lloyd's Register for the first three months of 1919.

The total amount of all shipping under construction on that date in Allied and neutral countries was given as 7,796,266 tons. Great Britain's share of this was 2,254,845. The United States was then building 4,185,523 tons of shipping.

These figures credit the United States with 75 per cent of the total tonnage under construction in Allied or neutral countries outside of Great Britain and it is pointed out that the United States is now building 28 times as much as it was in June, 1914. One London paper says the effect of so many newly built ships entering into sea-going trade is already being felt.
