

DANCE MASTERS JOIN PREACHERS IN GOOD MOVE

ATLANTIC CITY, June 15.—The International Association of Dancing Masters today linked hands with ministerial associations and welfare organizations to purge public dancing of vulgarity. By resolution members in practically every big city in this country will be directed to assist in any campaigns to this end.

The association contended that the wave of indecent dancing sweeping over the country today exemplified by such dances as "Shaking the Shimmy," "Discarding the Lingerie," etc. is due directly to the depravity of song writers. The indecent sections are encouraged by songs with suggestive titles and suggestive meanings by song boosters and cabarets with the accompaniment of vulgar and lewd body movements, the delegates aver.

ESKIMO FIGHTS IN YANKEE ARMY

ST. MICHAELS, Alaska (BY MAIL).—One native Alaska Eskimo, George Saggak, donned the American uniform and reached the battle lines in France and Belgium, according to information reaching here. Alaskans believe Saggak is the only Eskimo from this section who fought in the American trenches. Others who enlisted did not reach the front.

Writing in quaint "pidgin" English, common to the natives here, Saggak has sent several letters to his relatives in St. Michaels. The first letters came from Camp Lewis, Wash., where Saggak was a private in the

Ninety First Division. He continued writing after he went overseas. "I am trying just my best," said one letter, written as he sat "in under the firing line. I certainly like to see Germans lose the game, and we are all good American boys very anxious to go over the top and give a good punching to German."

BIG CONVENTION ON AT SALT LAKE

SALT LAKE CITY, June 15.—The Rotary Victory Convention which title has been given to the 10th annual convention of the International Association of Rotary clubs, opened in the famous Mormon tabernacle here today, close to 5000 Rotarians being present at the opening session. Arrival of other thousands thru the day it was expected, would increase the attendance to 10,000 before the actual business of the convention is well started. Many special trains from the east and one from the northwest were due this morning all bringing hundreds of delegates—real bringing boosters from the three cities are contending for next year's convention—Atlantic City, Cleveland and New Orleans.

A business session was to be held this afternoon and the Salt Lake Rotary Club will be host this evening to the visitors at a dinner. Tomorrow morning the real business of the sessions begins, when John Napier Dyer, Vincennes, Indiana, district governor of the Eleventh Rotary district, will deliver the "rotary" address.
