

# HUGE PRICES FOR ANTIQUES

LONDON, (Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—The enormous fortunes made in England during the war are responsible for record-breaking prices which sellers of antiques of every kind are realizing in London auction rooms. In the opinion of men who have long been close to the trade the whole country is being searched for treasures of all kinds which find ready sale at prices which hitherto have only been paid by foreigners.

A mysterious portrait which recently appeared in one auction room and was said by some one to have been painted by Franz Hals brought \$60,000, altho its authenticity was even now not established. A Reynolds portrait up to the present had not attracted much attention was easily sold for \$70,000, and pictures by much lesser lights brought phenomenal prices.

Artistic furniture is in even more demand. Six Chippendale Gothic chairs recently sold at a country sale for \$1,125. In spite of the fact that modern artists are copying this particular design with marked success and only the trained expert can detect the difference. At another country sale two chippendale tables brought \$1,600 and a Chippendale cabinet \$4,250.

Sheraton furniture is not so popular, excellent tables going as low as \$100. An old harpsichord in a William and Mary case sold for \$2,500 and a grandfather's clock gave its fortunate owner \$600 in spite of the fact that the clock had probably ceased to tick more than a hundred years ago.

Illuminated manuscripts also are in demand, and as in the case of furniture, record prices are being obtained. Letters of David Garrick and a few by his wife, to noted persons of their time, caused spirited bidding, but were withdrawn and will be offered again.

Efforts to trace the purchasers of some of the choicest offerings have revealed the presence in the market of persons who never before paid any attention to antiques. Many of them are persons who accumulated large fortunes during the war, and now that they have acquired fine houses have set out, with the aid of experts, to give them the ancient touch required by good taste.

## KLAMATH FISHING WELL ADVERTISED

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—Deep-sea fishing is offering anglers the best sport at the present time. Reports from Santa Cruz state that bay fishing for salmon has yielded splendid results.

The best inland fishing at the moment has been found at Belden, Angels, Clisco and Huntington Lake in the Sierra Nevadas; and in Link and Klamath Rivers and Cherry Creek in the Klamath country.

In the Sacramento river country the sport has been indifferent.

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# BAKER WOULD LIKE TO QUIT

NEW YORK, June 15.—Secretary of War Baker, speaking at a luncheon at the Hotel Biltmore, said that he was very anxious to return to private life. In the course of his speech the secretary also told several new war stories, one of them to the effect that when Marshal Joffre was in this country in 1917 he had estimated that American contribution in men to the war would be somewhere between 400,000 and 500,000. His expected total represented, the secretary remarked, "The wildest expectation of the French general staff."

## EAT WHALE FLESH

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 15.—The flesh of the whale as food is advocated in a pamphlet issued by the bureau of fisheries. Recipes for making succulent dishes from whale meat are included in the pamphlet, which advises retail dealers to make the flesh of the whale a part of their regular stock.

This action is in furtherance of the efforts to popularize fresh, frozen and canned whale meat as food. The bureau is advised that the whaling companies in position to furnish fresh and frozen whale meat have not been able to supply the demand.

IPSWICH, England.—The Great White hotel, one of the most famous of Dickens inns is to be sold.

Over the front porch the sign, described by Mr. Pickwick, as a "stone statue of some rampaging animal, with flowing mane and tail, distinctly resembling an insane carthorse," is still in existence.

## COL. LEADER QUILTS UNIVERSITY POST

EDGEMONT, June 12.—Colonel John M. Leader has tendered his resignation as military commandant and instructor at the University of Oregon, and at the close of the present semester will leave for British Columbia. In a year or so, when his affairs are in shape, Colonel Leader expects to return to Oregon and make his home here. Colonel Leader was commander of the Royal Irish Rifles at the start of the war. In a battle on the Somme he was severely wounded, and upon his discharge from the hospital came to the University of Oregon and took charge of the reserve officers' training corps. Several successful seasons were held, and many of the commissioned officers from Oregon are graduates of the preliminary course at Oregon. Colonel Leader lectured all over the state and did much to arouse the war spirit which made Oregon first in all patriotic and military measures.
