BELGIANS CALLING WILHELM TO TRIAL

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, June 18.—The Frankfort Gazette publishes a Brussels dispatch stating the Belgian attorney general has posted official notices citing Wilhelm Hohenzollern, Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria and General Opler to appear before the Brussels court of appeals October 14 and answer to crimes committed in Belgium during German occupation.

In commenting the Gazette said the Belgians apparently are unable to wait until the former kaiser's trial under the provisions of the peace treaty.
