

COMMERCE BODY AN URGENT NEED

INCREASE OF STREAM OF INQUIRIES SHOWS NECESSITY FOR IMMEDIATE REORGANIZATION OF CLUB.

The necessity for revamping the Commercial Club grows every day, especially the importance of securing the financial sinews of war. Capt. Applegate still answers the letters from everywhere and sends forth all information which is available in regard to the town which has won the reputation of the liveliest young city on the coast, one that with a population of seven thousand handles more freight than any other town in the state, a town that has built a railroad during the war period and is now increasing its payroll through the development of the lumber industry with leaps and bounds.

Following are a few extracts from recent letters, received mostly today.

"What is the population of your town and what is your payroll? Do you know of an established furnishing goods business for sale? Are rents high, and is it possible to find a good location to put in a good up-to-date line of general merchandise?"

Another: "I am interested and thinking of coming, how is your irrigable land and what business is there for a man with \$7000?"

Another: "I am looking for a location in Oregon and am of the opinion that Southern Oregon is where I want to make my home. Would like to identify myself with newspaper or garage business and have some money to invest."

Another: "Would like to visit Klamath Falls with my family this summer. Can I secure a furnished house-keeping cottage or tent at some resort or lake where we can enjoy good fishing and some hunting later on?"

Another: "Will you please give me general information in regard to opportunities in your county, paying particular attention to state lands, irrigated lands, swamp lands, homestead lands, cut-over lands and general land values?"

The executive secretary of the Pacific States Defense League writes from Seattle under date of June 12: "I trust you will find it possible to attend the approaching good roads convention in San Francisco as per the enclosed invitation. I am assured it will be worth while. At that time I am planning for a meeting of our officers to plan for the year's work ahead. This was repeatedly brought out during court proceedings, as court records will prove. Henry Albers is in no way connected with Albers Bros' Milling Com-

pany, either as owner of stock or in any manner whatever. He was at one time an officer and stockholder, but even then held only ten per cent of the stock. He was compelled to resign in October of last year.
