NO SHEVLIN-HIXON MILL TO BE BUILT AT BEND

BEND, June 19.—Plans for the construction of an additional mill at Bend by the Shevlin-Hixon Lumber company were abandoned as a result of the recent tour of inspection of the

properties of the company by its eastern officials. Options on a mill site secured by the company about one mile north of this city have been released, according to T. A. McCann, manager of the company's plant here.

Rumors of the construction of a mill at Crescent to take care of the timber owned by the Shevlin-Hixon company in that section were declared to be without foundation by McCann.

Logs from Crescent timber tract will be handled at the company's mill in Bend, he declared, and no material addition to the equipment of the company operating facilities will be made at this time.
