

REORGANIZES COMMISSION

GOVERNOR OLCOTT ANNOUNCES THAT HE WILL RECONSTRUCT THE INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENT COMMISSION

SALEM, June 21.—Governor Olcott said today that the impending re-organization of the industrial accident Commission, which he announced Sunday, including the ap-

pointment of J. W. Ferguson, Democrat, and Will T. Kirk, Republican, and the retirement of Harvey Beckwith and Wilford Allen, will in no manner interfere with the investigation of the commission previously ordered at the request of the Portland Labor Council. Governor Olcott has asked Beckwith for his resignation. Commissioner Allen's term has already expired. The Governor said he was dissatisfied with the work of the commission as at present constituted.
