### HARRY K. THAW IS AGAIN IN LIMELIGHT.

NEW YORK, July 1.—On receipt of information that Harry K. Thaw has been visiting his mother in Pittsburgh, instead of being incarcerated in an insane asylum in Pennsylvania, District Attorney Swann has ordered new extradition papers prepared in an effort to have Thaw returned to New York to face serious charges made by Frederick Gump Jr., a Kansas city boy.

Governor Brumbaugh of Pennsylvania had previously refused to honor extradition papers from New York, on the ground that the young Pittsburgh millionaire had not been declared insane in Pennsylvania.

Swann holds that if Thaw is sane enough to be allowed to visit his mother, he is in condition to stand trial here.

### WILHELM DREADS TRIAL WORSE THAN DEATH.

LONDON, July 1.—The kaiser will kill himself rather than submit to the indignity of trial by his enemies, according to his son, the ex-crown prince, in an interview with the Daily Express correspondent at Wieringen.

The prince made this declaration after a conference with his father, which he had this week. It was to the castle where the ex-kaiser is interned that he had gone, and not to Germany the Crown Prince said. He seemed to enjoy the excitement caused by his temporary absence from the island.

Mueller was one of the most conspicuous German delegates at the International Socialist Conference, which met in Bern in February.

### HOME AIR SERVICE READY.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Army airplanes in commission or available for immediate service number 3400, it is officially announced after an inventory has been made at air service fields and stations over the country. The survey shows that should an emergency arise today, there will be available for instant duty—as soon as the flyers could be put down at the banks—a total of 1240 "battle planes," or enough to form 50 squadrons.

Backing up the 1240 battle planes are 882 of the same type in storage, but recently tested and capable of being put in commission within a few hours. In trained personnel there are 1394 flying officers.
