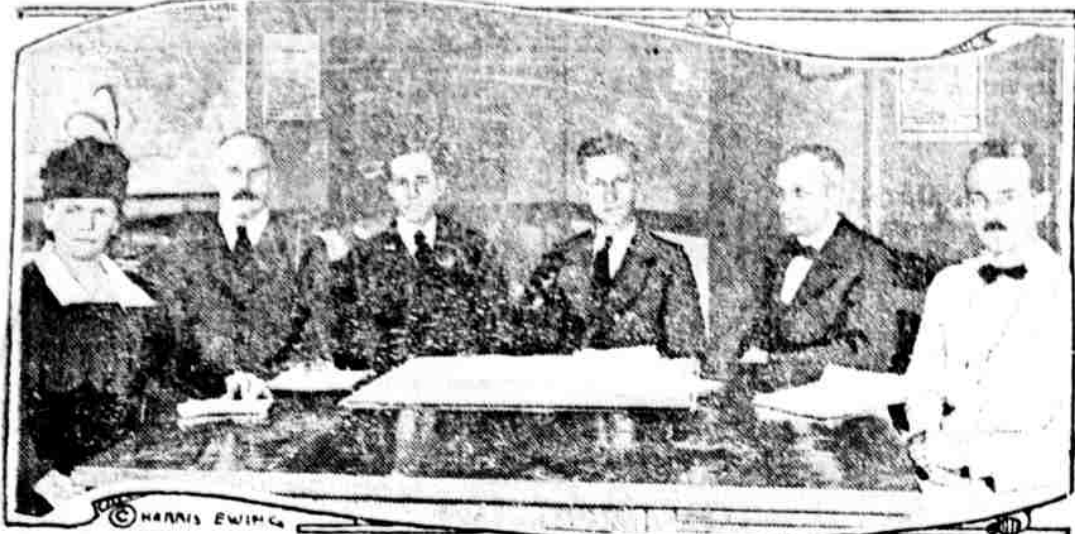


FOUND A MILLION JOBS AND ARE LOOKING FOR MORE

RESENT CHARGES

TWO LOCAL BOYS OVERSEAS ANSWER CHARGES MADE BY A GIRL THAT RED CROSS GIRLS NOT NEEDED TO CHEER SOLDIERS

Exception to a letter from a girl named Marbury who sent a letter from overseas to an eastern paper stating that Red Cross girls, Y. M. C. A. entertainers, and other girls doing war work overseas were not necessary to help cheer up the boys, was taken by Lieutenant Horace Shidler, who is well known in Klamath Falls. Lieutenant Shidler's poem, that appears below, was printed in the Chicago Tribune and represents the opinion of the fighters in France who were cheered by these ever-willing girls.

Corporal F. H. Hilbromer, of Battalion D of the 20th Field Artillery, who has many friends in Klamath Falls, gives the spirit of the men reacting against the letter in a note sent to his mother who resides in town. The letter and poem follow:

Wittlich, Germany, May 25, '19.

Dear Mother.—I was looking over the paper last night, the Chicago Tribune published in Paris, and I saw this poem in it written by Horace Shidler. I thought perhaps you would like to see it. I think it's the same fellow from Klamath Falls.

This Miss Marbury wrote a piece in the paper about Red Cross girls, Y. M. C. A. entertainers and other girls weren't necessary over here to help cheer the boys and a lot of other stuff. Now every one got sore at her and different soldiers are writing to the Chicago Tribune about her. And Horace Shidler sent this poem. I think it's pretty good, don't you?

Well, we are still loafing around waiting for orders to go back. All we do is eat, drink and sleep and go

to the movies. A year ago today we left Camp Taylor for Montreal, where we went on board ship.

Well, I guess I'll write a few lines to Sis.

Good bye and keep well.

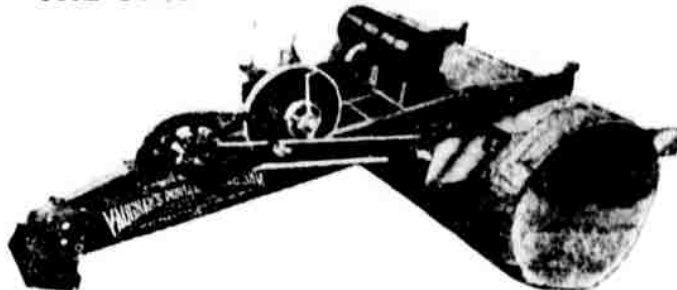
