

## TWO KILLED IN STRIKER'S ROW

PEORIA, July 9.—The majority of the employees of the Corn Product's Refining Company at Peoria struck today when officials of the company failed to grant the closed shop as demanded by the workers. At the company's plant at Argo, where two persons were killed, and scores wounded in the fight between guards and strikers late yesterday, over 2,000 were reported to be striking.

### ROADS FINALLY REPAIRED.

Tom Dixon, the county road commissioner, was in town this afternoon and reported that the last load of cinders had been dumped on the Exell lane Tuesday and would be spread by evening. This cinder road thru the lane will connect with the rock one, built last winter and will be quite an improvement over the impassable mud hole it has been up until now.

Work will begin on the slaughter house road today and it will be about a month's job to complete it. This is another much traveled road and is in very bad shape. The cinders are being hauled by A. Wickstrom of Seaside.

### GERMANS RATIFY TREATY.

WEIMAR, July 9.—All doubt and conjecture whether or not the German National Assembly would ratify the Peace Treaty was removed today when that body voted for ratification by a count of 209 to 135.

The German National Assembly was the first elective body in any country which signed the treaty to accept the ratifying resolution. Ratification by Germany will no doubt cause the Allies to raise the blockade and lift the commercial censorship on all communications with Germany.

### GOVERNMENT WILL RENT BIG ISLANDS

VENTURA, Cal., July 9.—The government has announced that two of the Channel Islands, about sixty miles off shore, are for rent and their descriptions are on file in the Ventura county courthouse here. The islands are Santa Barbara and San Nicolas. The latter is at present under lease to J. G. Howland of Los Angeles.

San Nicolas 44 miles westward from San Clemente, is seven and a half miles long and has a general width of two miles and a half. The highest point is 890 feet. Two-thirds

of the island are practically bare sand, and the balance is covered with coarse grass and a few patches of scrub oak. There is a good flock of sheep on the island.

Santa Barbara is a mile and a half long and a mile wide. There is not water and no grass, but plenty

of prickly—pear shrub. This island rises to a height of 547 feet. Landing is at all times difficult.
