JAPANESE STRIKERS BECOME VIOLENT

TOKIO, July 10.—Labor troubles are taking place in Japan. At a gold mine in Shizuoka prefecture, 100 miners went on strike recently and, armed with pickaxes and shovels, raided the residence of the mine officials and destroyed or damaged the buildings and furniture. The local police force suppressed the rioters. The cause of the trouble is dissatisfaction over wages.

Over 1,000 women and girls employed in a big silk factory at Uyeda have gone on strike for higher wages. Similar occurrences are reported from various parts of the empire. One cause of the unrest is the soaring of rice, which is now higher than last summer when the country was involved in serious race disturbances.
