TRAMWAY FARES CAUSE TROUBLE

CHARGES IN SUBURBAN DISTRICTS RAISED ONE HUNDRED PER CENT OVER PRE-WAR DAYS—SAY PUBLIC OPINION MOST STRONGLY OPPOSES THE RAISE

LONDON, July 11.—The question of the increase in the tramway fares and also those of the motor omnibuses has caused widespread discontent here lately. In some instances the fares in London and the suburban districts have been raised more than one hundred percent over those charged in pre-war days.

The result has been that public opinion has been worked up to such an extent that nearly every day London members of Parliament are asking questions on the subject in the House of Commons and deputations are frequently seeking interviews with the London County Council and the omnibus companies concerned.

The first step toward the increase was the abolition of the half penny fare and latterly the reduction of the distances which could be traversed for the penny fare.

The companies declare that the increase is necessary to meet the extra expenses which have occurred by the workmen's demands for shorter hours and more pay. The public alleges that the additional cost of running is made up by the extra fares taken since hostilities ended.

An interesting sidelight on this is provided by the accounts of the Glasgow Corporation Tramways in the next largest city to London. The year that has just closed has proved a record for the city. Prior to the war the fares were the cheapest in the country and have since been maintained as before. The revenue for fares for the year 1918-19 totalled 1,500,000 pounds, an increase of 123,000 pounds over the year 1917.

18. The number of passengers carried increased by over 22,000,000. It is stated in the report that 60 per cent of the increase came from the halfpenny fares.

TOKIO, July 11.—The famous horse, "Longevity," which was presented by the Russian General Stessel to General Nogai as a token of respect on the occasion of the surrender of Port Arthur, in January, 1905, died the other day. "Longevity's" mane has been sent to the Nogai shrine at Momoyama.

MUCH BLOODSHED IN TORN RUSSIA

LOS ANGELES, July 11.—Conditions in the Russian Caucasus were characterized as "indescribable" in a cablegram received here from Dr. H. J. F. Main, commissioner to that district of Russia for the American Committee for Armenian and Syrian Relief.

"On the streets of Alexandropol on the day of my arrival 192 corpses were picked up," cabled Dr. Main. "This is far below the average per day. One-seventh of the refugees are dying each month. The total number of refugees is 320,000."

"Another season of famine," said Dr. Main, "is inevitable unless there is immediate action by some compelling power."

He continued: "The world appears to be unconscious of the overwhelming human tragedy that is being enacted in the Caucasus. The Turk and his radical confederates are carrying forward with growing efficiency the policy of extermination developed during the war by the method of starvation. Starvation is aided by typhus and already cholera is developing."

by actual census at our bread and soup rations; in the other are 7,000. A winter of exile in the Caucasus has produced a condition of horror unparalleled among the horrors of the war.

"The question of political expediency," concluded Dr. Main, "should be forgotten in the presence of this catastrophe. These people look to America. Our government is under moral obligations to respond."

AVIATOR PREVENTS BIG FIRE

ONTARIO, Cal., July 11.—An army aviator who discovered a big brush fire as he was flying over the ranch of J. C. Smyth near here recently, turned his plane back to the city and by signals informed the Ontario Fire Department of the blaze. Mr. Smyth whose home was in danger, had tried to summon the Fire Department several times by telephone, but owing to a strike of operators was unable to do so. A chemical engine responded to the aviator's appeal and the ranch house and other buildings were saved.

BOY OF 9 NAVY RECRUITER

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo., July 11.—Kennett Young, son of Captain C. R. Young of the local navy recruiting station, although but nine years old, is assistant recruiting officer here supervising distribution of posters and other publicity matters.
