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NORMAN ROSS WINS SWIMMING RACES AT OVERSEAS GAMES

SAN FRANCISCO, July 12.—The excellent showing made by Norman Ross, the Pacific coast swimmer and former member of the Olympic club of this city, in the allied games held in France, did not surprise his friends who freely had predicted he would maintain his reputation.

The fact that he won every swimming event in which he was entered is held as additional proof by these friends that their claim that Ross is one of the greatest and most versatile swimmers of all that is not without merit. While swimmers like Duke Kahanamoku and others have been world beaters in a few events in which they have specialized as, for instance, the sprints, Ross has proved himself a master swimmer in practically all the distances—long and short.

The career of Ross has been rather an unusual one for the reason that he sprang into fame practically with one plunge into the water. Ross has been swimming for some time and while experts conceded he had the markings of a champion, for one reason or another he never seemed able to make any more than a mediocre showing. One or two of his admirers, who still had faith in his ability to make good, prevailed on the Olympic Club to send him to some Eastern championships—a last chance as it were. The consent was grudgingly given. The subsequent career of Ross as a swimmer is internationally known, but only a few know how nearly he missed the opportunity of ever becoming a factor in the annals of American swimming.
