CHAIN OF GOOD ROADS TO LINK GOV. PARKS

To insure the tying together of the National Parks and monuments with a chain of good motor highways, is the purpose of a meeting that has been called at the Grand Canyon Hotel in Yellowstone National Park, on August 8 and 9, according to a letter received this morning by the Klamath Commercial Club, from the Associated Commercial Club Presidents of Montana.

Horace M. Allbright of Washington, D. C., will represent the government in this conference and it is most desired that Klamath Falls send a representative, in that the town is located within close range of the Crater Lake National Park. Interested parties in town have already submitted a map suggesting what is believed to be the best auto highway to Yellowstone Park. This is exactly in line with suggestions already made by the local Commercial Club.

The following is an extract from the letter referred to:

"No doubt you are aware of the vigorous propaganda being issued by the governments of Europe in an effort to get tourists from America in the coming years to go over-seas for their vacations. Before the war American tourists spent \$250,000,000 annually abroad. Now the tourist trade and interest has been turned to the West, and it must be kept coming our way. We cannot afford to let the tide start rolling again toward foreign lands."
