In the passing of Mrs. Nellie Gherston, a little family has lost a wife and mother, and a community has lost a bright, noble character.

Mrs. Gherston has been a resident of Klamath County about five years living near the Stukel bridge and making many friends thru all the Mt. Laki country. She was born and reared at Machias, Maine, securing her early education there and at the Emerson School of Oratory, Boston, Massachusetts.

For a time she taught school in Maine, going later to Peru, Indiana, where she was a special teacher in the high schools of that city in Education, Reading and physical culture. Later she moved with a sister to Salmon, Idaho, where she again taught. Fifteen of the best years of her life were given to the instruction of the young in country grade and city schools. She was counted a very bright woman and highly esteemed as a teacher wherever she worked, in that capacity.

At Salmon, Idaho she was married to Mr. L. T. Gherston. After their marriage they moved to Klamath Falls and have made their home on the ranch thirteen miles from the city ever since. Mrs. Gherston was just in her prime. Her many abilities as a teacher were carried over into her

home life and the care of the two children with whom God has blessed her, a boy of 13 and a girl of 11 years. These children, together with the husband, will sadly miss the kind and loyal mother.

In the east live the feeble father and mother, who are aged, and three sisters to mourn the passing of their loved one.

In her religious faith Mrs. Gherston was Christian Scientist, which she had studied much, and in which she found great comfort and help for her daily life.

There were in attendance at the funeral services two sisters of Mr. Gherston, one from Southern California and one from Salmon, Idaho. Many friends from Mt. Laki and Klamath Falls were present at the services which were held at the chapel in charge of Rev. E. P. Lawrence, pastor of the Presbyterian Church. Mrs. E. B. Henry sang very touchingly two hymns suited to the service.
