HIBERNIANS OPEN BIG CONVENTION IN SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17.—The national convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians in America to open here tomorrow will be unique in the history of this order. Never since the organization was founded more than fifty years ago has a national convention been held west of the Rocky mountains and no other convention has been attended by a provisional president of the "Irish Ramon de Valera, "president" of Ireland, telegraphed the arrangements committee he would be here July 17, the date for the convention's opening. This announcement caused estimation of the number of delegates visitors to be greatly increased.
Adjournment is scheduled for July 19, but many of the visitors are expected to remain until July 20 to witness the unveiling in Golden Gate Park by De Valera of a statue of Robert Emmet, Irish patriot. This monument is the gift of United States Senator James D. Phelan to the city of San Francisco.
De Valera said he would be accompanied to San Francisco by a party of six, including Harry Boland his secretary. Boland, like his chief, is a Sinn Fein member of the Dail Eireann of National Assembly of the "Irish Republic."
De Valera and Boland came to America from Ireland without passports. The manner of De Valera's coming never has been made known, but Boland came as a stoker on a transport.

MRS. DOW'S MOTHER DIES.

Mrs. M. E. Allen of Sacramento, mother of Mrs. H. P. Dow, of 204 Nelson Street died this morning. Mrs. Allen's death was due to heart failure, she being 81 years of age. Mrs. Dow will leave tomorrow morning for Sacramento to attend the funeral.

The picture taken on the Island of Wieringen, where he is living in exile, shows him without his mustache and looking considerably aged and worn.

JACKSONVILLE ALL BUT GUTTED BY FIRE

MEDFORD, July 17.—Jacksonville, the oldest settlement in Southern Oregon, was saved from complete destruction by fire yesterday af-

ternoon only through the quick aid of the Medford Fire department in sending a motor hose car, when the Jacksonville hose burst in a dozen places. Four houses and one barn were completely gutted, and more than a dozen houses were scorched. The loss is estimated at \$10,000.
