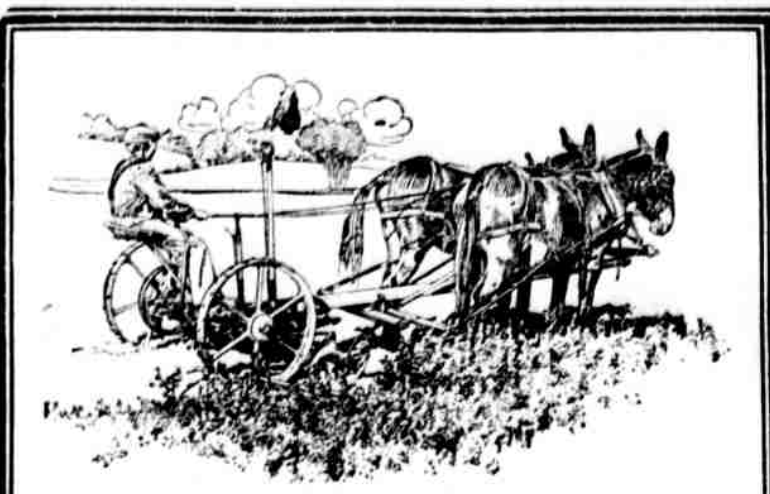

Boston, Mass., July 17.—Eight thousand employees of the railroad system, stuck today in protest against the War Labor Board's delay in announcing the award in the wage dispute and tied up car service on street subways, and elevated lines here and twelve adjacent cities and towns.
