WHEREAS, the Common Council deems it expedient to change the grade on 5th Street between Main and Pine Streets in the City of Klamath Falls;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the grade on 5th Street between Main and Pine Street be changed as follows, to-wit:

At 720 feet from the northerly line of Main Street on 5th Street from elevation 150 to feet to 154 50 feet reckoned from the established city datum.

SERVICE DOGS HEROES OF WAR DEMOBILIZED

NOME, Alaska, July 17.—Battle flags of the world having been furl-ed, Nome's canine war veterans—Alaska dogs sent from here to the Western front—are soon to be demobilized, according to word received from the Blue Cross society, which is known as the "Animal Red Cross." Some of the dogs may be sent back to Nome.

No service flags hang in Nome for these Malamutes, Siberian dogs and huskies and it is generally understood that all of Nome will not welcome all of the dogs back. Nome has enough dogs now, it is believed.

Some of the dogs formerly owned by "Scotty" Allen, noted driver of fast dog teams, will be given a welcome. Allen made a specialty of raising fast dogs for the races here each spring.

A large number of dogs were taken to France during the second year of the war by Lieutenant Hass. They were sold to the French government at about twenty-five dollars apiece. When the dogs reached France some of them did the work required of them and some of them didn't. One report came back that Alaska dogs were not suited for the work.

Some of the Alaska dogs were used in the Alps hauling sleds over the winter snows. Others were used in various lines of work along the battle fronts.

Approximately 10,000 dogs were used by the allies on the western front during the war. Many of them were loaned to the French government and are to be returned to their owners.

PEOPLE LIVE ON CARIBOU

VALDEZ, Alaska, July 18.—Nature has proven a generous provider for the town of Franklin, Alaska, and its residents. A herd of caribou estimated to number 100,000 recently invaded that district and residents of the section laid aside all the juicy steaks and rib they will need for the coming year. Ranches near-by provide all vegetables needed. Ninety percent of the population are over 50 years of age—all are able to work, and the absence of a doctor in the vicinity has not been felt, for sickness is unknown.
