

ARMY OUTPOSTS GUARD BORDER

Cavalry and Infantry Detachments Will Garrison Outposts to Protect Border from Incursions of Mexicans

EL PASO, Texas, July 19.—Like the chain of forts built in the days of the Indians to guard the Staked Plains and the Southwest from raids by marauding bands of savages, the United States Army is building permanent outposts along the Mexican border to prevent incursions by armed bands of Mexican bandits across the border. These will extend from the Pacific to the mouth of the Rio Grande at Brownsville, Tex., and will be garrisoned by detachments of infantry and cavalry from the Southern department.

Construction work is in progress on these permanent outposts in the El Paso district, including the Big Bend sub-district of Texas and the sub-district of New Mexico. In the Big Bend, where many Mexican raids have occurred, these outposts are being built like the blockhouses of frontier days with trenches surrounding the low adobe and concrete buildings, built in the form of a quadrangle, give the best possible protection. At Paly, Redford, Hedford, Glen Springs and Vado these outposts are being constructed under the direction of Col. George Langhorne, commander of the sub-base. A cantonment also is being built at Marfa, Texas, 60 miles from the border, to serve as headquarters for the outposts.

outpost is being built at the Santa Fe street approach to the international bridge to Juarez. This will house the dismounted cavalry bridge guard who inspect every thing sent to Mexico, At Yuleta, Fabens, Fort Hancock and Sierra Blanca, Tex. similar buildings will be erected for the patrols and detachments guarding the borders from Mexico. All will be plastered with cement on the exterior and will have stables for cavalry horses, electric lighting systems, running water, shower baths and modern mess kitchens. A cantonment is being built of brick at Fort Bliss to house the reserve troops for these outposts which will include 110 men and four officers each.

Outpost buildings along the New Mexican border will be constructed of lumber from Camp Cody, N. M. and unused material purchased for other cantonments during the war. The headquarters will be located at Columbus with outposts at Hachita, The Corner Ranch, Slaughter's ranch and other strategic points along the New Mexico border. Each outpost will cost approximately \$18,000 and will be built under the supervision of the El Paso division quartermaster's office.

Branch depots of the zone supply depot in El Paso will also be built along the border to supply these outposts and truck, wagon and pack trains organized to carry supplies, ordnance and forage for the isolated border outposts along the Rio Grande.
