## REMARKABLE RECORD MADE BY BIG TRUCK

The story of the remarkable record made by the big 3 1/2 ton White Truck, driven from Portland to this city by Fred Murphy of the O. K. Transfer company, did not contain all of the great things accomplished by it. Notwithstanding the fact that it carried three and one-half tons of merchandise for the Mason-Ehrmann company, it made the trip on a running schedule that averaged fifteen miles an hour. After reaching here, it was loaded with a similar load and sent to Merrill and back again. Then the cap was removed from the radiator and the water was right in sight, not a drop having been added from the time it was filled in Portland. This feat is recognized by all automobile men as being one of the most remarkable performances ever made by any make of machine. Aside from this, not one minute was spent on repairs or adjustment.

This truck is handled in this territory by D. A. Denyon of the O. K. Blacksmith Shop, thru whom Mr. Murphy purchased the one he got.

## WILSON ASKS THAT COMMISSION HAVE SENATE APPROVAL

WASHINGTON, July 21.—President Wilson today asked the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to approve the appointment of the American members of the Reparations Commission, as provided for under the Peace Treaty. They are to act provisionally until the Senate acts on the document.

The President was of the opinion that it was important to the business interests that the United States be represented on the Commission. The committee debated the proposition today but failed to act, the Republicans opposing the requests. It is understood that the President will appoint Bernard M. Baruch, of New York, as American representative on the Commission. The committee will consider the proposition tomorrow.

## AMERICANS VISIT OLD BATTLEFIELDS

LONDON, July 21.—American business men and women now in London are being offered a view of famous battlefields in Belgium and France for \$60, which includes transportation and meals for three days.

The tours are under the direction of the Belgium government and are made by automobile. Visitors are taken to Belgium via Dover and Ostend. Zeebrugge is visited and a whole day is spent in that vicinity where there are still many interesting if gruesome evidences of the war. The itinerary includes Ypres, the Yser, the "big Bertha" at Leugenboom, Dixmude, Poelcapelle, Zillebeke, St. Julien, Houthulst forest, and Furnes, all names familiar to American newspaper readers who followed the war from day to day.

## SCOTCH SAVE ON THEIR KILTS.

LONDON, July 21.—Curtalement in the amount of cloth used in the kilt worn by Scottish troops has saved \$115,000 to the government. The Scottish troops did not resent the innovation, and to all appearances their kilts are as full and as picturesque as ever.

## RECOMMENDS SILVER MEDAL BE AWARDED

LONDON, July 21.—The president of the Board of Trade has recommended to King George that a silver medal be awarded to Lieut. Ross P. Whitmarsh of the United States navy for gallantry in life saving, when the British steamer Dwinsk was sunk by an enemy submarine in the Atlantic Ocean about a year ago.

Lieutenant Whitmarsh was in charge of a life boat in which nineteen British subjects took refuge. The boat encountered a cyclone but the lieutenant brought her thru it safely and the record states that his bravery and devotion saved the lives of all.

## SUCCESSFUL BIDDER NOT DECIDED AS YET

Consideration of the bids offered by six firms for possession of the Klamath County Road Bonds in the sum of \$307,704 will continue today at the County Court House, following the session of Saturday afternoon when the court was unable to arrive at a conclusion in the matter. Indications are that it will be Tuesday before the successful bidder is determined, in that the bids are so varied and comprehensive.

The firms bidding on the bonds are the Anglo-London & Paris National Bank, Lumbermen's Trust Co., Keeler Brothers, Clark-Kendall Co., Morris & Company, and The Bank of Merrill.

## W. C. T. U. HEAD ARRIVES TONIGHT.

Mrs. Murray A. Sleeth, State President of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, will arrive in Klamath Falls tonight and will deliver two or three lectures on subjects of general interest to women. While here she will be the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Grigsby, of 1028 Jefferson Street. Mrs. Sleeth expects to remain for a few days.

## EMPLOYES DEMAND INCREASE

CHICAGO, Ill., July 19.—Employees of Chicago's transportation lines decided today by an overwhelming vote to go on strike if their demands for increase in wages were not met. Women conductors of the elevated lines also joined the men in voting. Mayor Thompson has appointed a mediation commission.

## TEXAS ASKS FOR LIBERTY TO ACT.

AUSTIN, Texas, July 21.—The Texas Legislature has again called the attention of the President and Congress to the guerilla warfare that has been prevailing along the Texas-Mexican border since 1875. In so doing the legislature asked for the permission of "the liberty of action in protecting its citizens that the republic of Texas enjoyed before becoming in good faith a state of the Union."

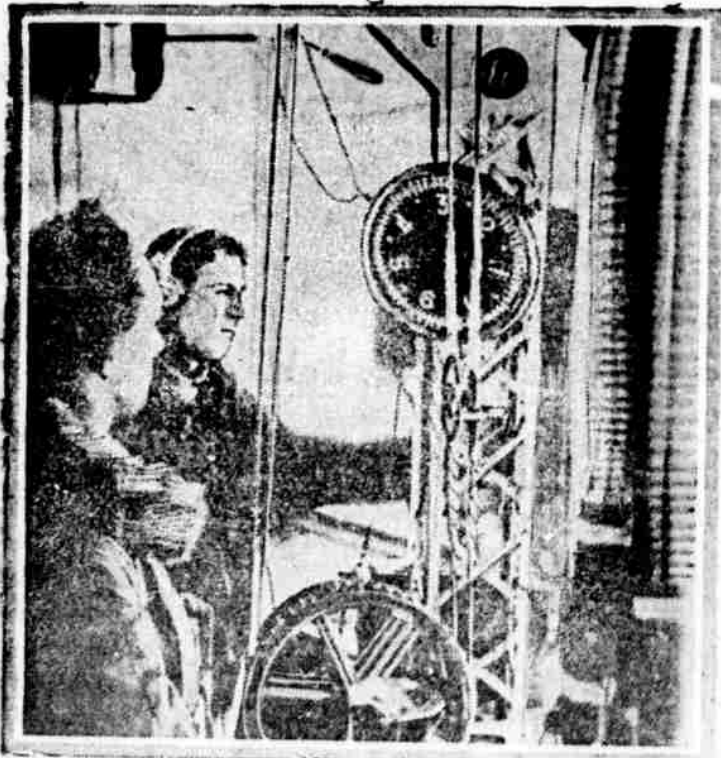
