

LONDON, July 21 .- The president of the Board of Trade has recommended to King George that a silver medal be awarded to Lieut. Ross P. Whitemarsh of the United States navy for gallantry in life saving. when the British steamer Dwinsk was sunk by an enemy submarine in the Atlantic Ocean about a year ago.

Lieutenant Whitemarsh was in charge of a life boat in which nineteen British subjects took refuge. The boat encountered a cyclone but the lieutenant brought her thru it safely and the record states that his bravery and devotion saved the lives of all.
