## WAR RESULTS IN STARVATION OF MANY BALKANS

**BUZEU, Roumania, July 22.**—Here in the midst of the world's richest oil fields, people have been actually starving.

Before the war this part of Rumania produced big fortunes in oil, being one of the greatest sources of European supply. Today its wells are in ruins and the people are destitute. The invading armies requisitioned everything that could be piled loose and transported, paralyzing one of the wealthiest industries in the Balkans.

Workers for the American Red Cross, which is distributing relief in the form of foods and medicines throughout the country, have found people eating bread made of leaves, twigs and bark from trees. People were baring the coats off their backs for small portions of corn and coarse bran. In one place the relief workers found a small local hospital in which the patients slept on boards with no mattress and little covering. At one home they found five fatherless children, the oldest only nine years of age, cooking a meal of tree bark and bran, while the mother was out at work in the fields.

"Typhus is very prevalent and there is an increasing amount of smallpox," says the American woman's report. "There is no doctor nor medicines in this village and absolutely no way of taking care of the sick. In another village which I visited the entire population of 500 persons was ill with some obscure form of contagious disease."

## OLD LETTER OF KING FERDINAND ADDED TO BIG COLLECTION

**SANTA FE, N. M., July 22.**—A letter bearing what is believed to be the only authentic signature of King Ferdinand of Spain—patron, with Queen Isabella, of the expedition of Columbus to the new world—that is extant in this country, forms one of the most important additions to the collections of the Historical Society of New Mexico. The letter is written to his cousin, the Duke of Infantado.

The document, which is dated December 28, 1512, is remarkably well preserved. It deals with the arrangements for the approaching marriage of the king's niece and the duke's son.

The letter concludes: "Everything is already prepared for the wedding, including the money which is to be given the said court as agreed."

The signature affixed is Ferdinand's famous "Yo, El Rey," ("I, the King").

## THREE MEXICANS ROBBED AMERICAN SAILORS.

**WASHINGTON, July 21.**—Three Mexicans in civilians clothes, armed with rifles, were the bandits which held up and robbed several American sailors in a launch from the Monitor Cheyenne near Tampico in early July, according to advices here today. The Mexican authorities have expressed their regret in being unable to apprehend the bandits so far.

## MANY MINING IN MEXICO CITY.

**MEXICO CITY, July 21.**—People of the state of Morelos, enlivened by the death of Zapata and of the horrors of seven years of war, are giving themselves over almost exclusively to mining. Iron and steel manufacturers in the capital are said to be receiving steady shipments of ores from Morelos and plans for mining development in the entire state are being made.

## CINEMATOGRAPH WILL BE OF DISTINCT VALUE.

**LONDON, July 22.**—A Mollock has attracted attention by exhibiting before the Royal Society a new form of cinematograph which, it is said, will prove of distinct value.

At present pictures are often shown at a rate considerably higher than that at which the photographs were taken in order to avoid the flickerings due to intermittent illu-

mination. Mollock's model, it is claimed, illuminates the screen continuously, thus allowing the picture to be shown at any rate desired—either slower or faster than the speed at which the events occurred.

## VILLA TAKES ENGLIS.

**EL PASO, Texas, July 22.**—Francisco Villa is a physical culture recruit. When he was at Villa Ahumada en route to attack Juarez, he was seen by residents of that little town doing setting up exercises every morning in front of the home of Jesus Yaletas, which he had appropriated as his headquarters. After 15 minutes of this the rebel leader would run the full length of the main street of Villa Ahumada 25 times to cover the five miles he set as a task for himself each day.
