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LEAGUE OF NATIONS SEC'Y KNOWS U. S.

LONDON, July 23.—Sir Eric Drummond, the first Secretary-General of the League of Nations, is a man in the early forties, of about middle height, with alert, rather humorous eyes and fine features. He is exceedingly witty, a most excellent companion and can sparkle at a dinner party as effectively as he can draft a clause of a treaty.

Sir Eric is said to possess an as-

tonishingly complete knowledge of the United States and for some years was a recognized authority in the Foreign Office to be consulted on American affairs. He is said to have a gift for international politics that has served his country well in several crises.

PLAY PRODUCER LEAVES FORTUNE OF \$2,000,000

LONDON, July 22.—It is learned that Imre Kiralfy, organizer of page-

ants and spectacular plays, who died at Brighton April 28, left a fortune of two million. It is stated that he realized a total return of \$22,750,000 for the colossal pageant he produced mostly in America and abroad. One pageant shown at the World's Fair in Chicago brought in about \$1,000,000. A statement issued here says this is the largest total of receipts in the history of the opera, drama, spectacle and pageantry.

RUMANIAN QUEEN AIDS SOLDIERS

Queen Marie Assists in Distribution of Trainload of American Red Cross Supplies

BUCHAREST, Rumania, July 23.—Queen Marie of Rumania is at present busily engaged in assisting in the distribution of a trainload of American Red Cross supplies, which she personally conveyed from Paris to Bucharest.

During her recent visit to France, the Queen made known the emergency medical needs of the Rumanian soldiers and refugees. She obtained three car-loads of medical and surgical equipment from the Red Cross and had three cars attached to the royal train on her return journey. Upon arrival here the supplies were immediately dispatched to central points for distribution to the military hospitals which were in need. Other supplies were set aside for the refugees fleeing from the fighting zone in Bessarabia.

These supplies have now been augmented by a shipload of material which has arrived at Galatz from the Red Cross storehouses in Athens. To insure their prompt delivery, Lieut.-Col. Henry W. Anderson, Red Cross Commissioner to the Balkans, himself accompanied the ship from Athens. It was met at Galatz by Rumanian staff officers, and its arrival was the occasion for a remarkable demonstration on the part of the populace.

The resumption of hostilities in Bessarabia is keeping the hospitals there well filled and in adding hundreds to the already large number of homeless refugees.

KEROSENE IS MORE PRECIOUS THAN GOLD IN SERBIAN TOWN

PIROT, SERBIA, July 23.—Kerosene distributed with other relief supplies by Red Cross agents here was received as if it were gold. A short time before, the Mayor of Pirot had paid \$110 for five gallon can of the precious liquid. During the entire Bulgarian occupation the inhabitants of this district had no lights in their homes after sun down.

Bread had been selling at 50 cents a pound, and the poor, unable to pay such a price, were living on cornmeal and oats. Now, with the arrival of tons of American flour and carloads of other supplies the situation is much relieved.

Dozens of children have been found in abandoned houses living on the charity of neighbors. Mothers are ready to give up their children to anyone who will give them food and shelter. There are thousands of orphans with no one to care for them.

The number of widows is distressingly large.

The famous rug-making industry here is at a standstill but the Americans are trying to re-establish the peasants at their old trade. As the Bulgarians took all the machinery, metal and tools of any value, the workers in mechanical trades now are without implements.

PEACE TREATY BILL APPROVED.
