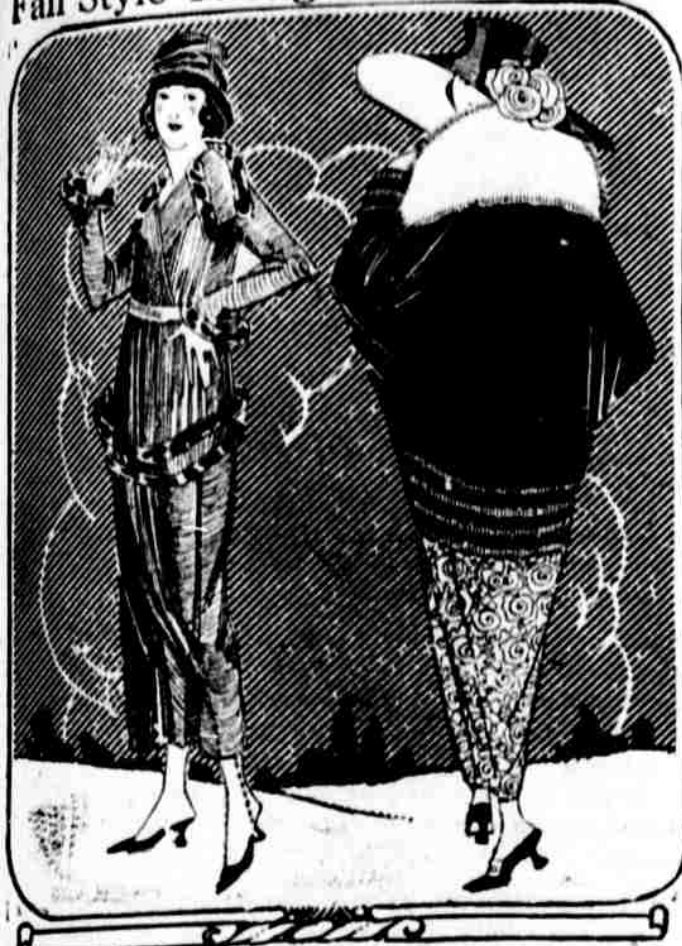


Fall Style Thoughts Have Arrived

JAPAN DENIES ANY BARTERING IN CASE

PARIS, July 23.—Denial was made today by the Japanese delegation to the Peace Conference that the Shantung agreement, whereby Japan was to secure control from China, was in exchange for the withdrawal of the Japanese contention regarding the racial clause in the League of Nations Covenant.

BOLSHEVIK OFFER PEACE FOR LENINE

LONDON, July 23.—It was reported here today that the Bolsheviki delegation arrived at Kishineff with an offer of peace to the commander of the Roumanian Dniester troops on behalf of Nikola Lenine.

Lenine offers to cede Bessarabia to Roumania on the consideration that Roumania prohibit Ukrainian citizens, bands of Admiral Kolchak, head of the Omsk government, from crossing the Roumanian frontier.

RIOTING CONTINUES IN SPITE OF TROOPS

WASHINGTON, July 23.—Despite the heavy guard of police and troops rioting continued in the negro section of Washington last night causing the death of a white man and probable fatal injury to another. Scores of fighters were injured by fists, clubs, stones and knives in the possession of the two warring elements. The arrival of 2000 troops and defense guards kept the rioting down to some extent. It is evident that a bitter feeling prevails between the whites and the negroes.

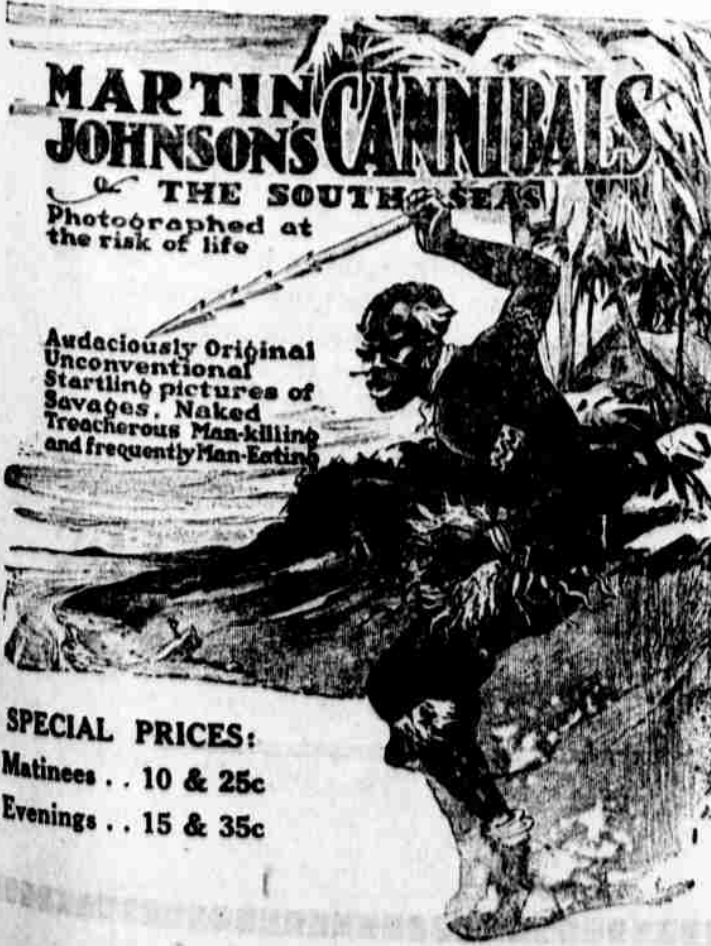
