BULGARIANS FIRE ON FRENCH REGIMENTS.

GENEVA, July 24. As a result of the attack on French soldiers by the Bulgarians, French regiments arrived today at Sofia, the Bulgarian capital, to rearm the local garrison. Dispatches stated that the French were attacked by the Bulgarians as the regiment was landing at Lon Palencia a few days ago. A lively fusillade ensued which lasted for over three hours. Three French were killed.
