WESTERN OREGON ROADS ARE IN GOOD CONDITION.

The following information is for motorists, campers and tourists concerning the roads over Western Oregon. It is prepared by the United States Forest Service and covers only the roads in or near the National Forests of Oregon.

McKenzie Highway: Open between Eugene and Sisters; in good condition to Blue river, and fair from Blue river to Sisters.

Willamette: Open between Eugene and Rigdon for machines and across summit for wagons. In fair condition.

Barlow: Open between Sandy and Wapinitia. In good condition to Twin Bridges. Poor condition, Twin Bridges to Clear Creek; fair condition from Clear Creek to Wapinitia.

Eugene-Florence. Open and in good summer condition between Eugene and Florence. The road over North Fork mountain has been greatly improved by recent work.

Medford-Klamath Falls: Open entire length and in fair condition. Cars can get to Crater Lake.

Anna Creek-Gold Beach: Open and in good condition, Carson City to Brookings; fair condition between Brookings and Gold Beach.

Grants Pass-Crescent City: Open entire length and in good condition.

Santiam Wagon Road: Open between Foster and summit to Cascades, and in fair condition. No reports of automobiles yet crossing the summit.

Waldport-Alesea: Open entire length and in passable condition for summer travel. The road south from Waldport via Yabats and Cape Perpetua to Ten Mile creek is open and in permanent summer condition.

Riddle-Tiller: Open and in good condition for entire length.

Cottage Grove-Disston: Open and in good condition between Cottage Grove and the Fusston ranch. Closed for autos between this point and the Bohemia. No detours possible. Wagons can get over this road.

Pacific Highway: Open and in excellent condition, except where construction is in progress, between Medford and Riddle. Because of paving operations between Grants Pass and Rogue river, detour over a rough road on the north side of the stream is necessary.

Three Rivers: Open between Willamina and Tillamook. Very rough for six miles through the Grande Ronde Indian Reservation; here for several days after heavy rains it is practically impassable. Construction work between Dolph and Hebo makes detour down the Little Nestucca necessary.

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Bandon-Gold Beach: Open and passable for light cars entire length.

LONG DROUGHT IN MONTANA

KILLS FISH AND BEAVERS.

HELENA, Mont., July 16.—Fish and beaver in the streams of Montana are among the sufferers of the drought that has prevailed in the state during the present season. The fish especially are being destroyed by the wholesale, and there is so little water in creeks that ordinarily afford fine fishing that it is feared by sportsmen that millions of fry will perish. Efforts to stock the streams with game fish have been made by the state and by sportsmen's associations, and it now appears that all this work may be undone.

Beavers, after having worked through the spring and early summer upon the construction of dams across streams in the state, have found themselves unable to collect enough water to submerge their homes.

MT. SAN BERNARDINO IS CLIMBED BY MOTORCYCLE.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., July 26.—Jack Fletcher and John E. Hogg announced here they had accomplished a ride on a two-seated motorcycle to the top of Mt. San Bernardino, commonly known as Mount Baldy, a lofty, snowcapped peak near here.

This height had been attained previously only by mountaineers afoot and with burros. The trail leading to the summit is seven and a half miles in length and very steep. In a single mile it rises 2,000 feet by a series of zigzags up a perpendicular cliff over a surface strewn with loose rocks and crumbled granite. Three hours and 42 minutes were required to reach the summit, which is 11,600 feet high.

WILL GET HUN CANNON.

HELENA, Mont., July 26.—The capitol grounds here are expected soon to be decorated with a large German cannon and carriage. Holter of this city, state chairman of the Victory loan committee, has been notified that the war department is shipping the big gun here.

It is planned to present the trophy to the state when it has been received and mounted.

WILD HORSES PRESENT BIG PROBLEM DURING DROUGHT.

HELENA, Montana, July 26.—The wild range horse, which has presented a problem to ranchers of this state in ordinary years, is doubly a burden during the present season, when range is at a premium on account of the drought. As a result, according to reports reaching here from several sections of the state, the wild horses are being hounded down by ranchers and shot.

Several projects for the extermination of the animals, the latest providing for a rendering plant for conversion of hide, hair and bones into merchantable products, have been advanced, but none have been brought to the point of operation. Because the horses are so wild, their slaughter is said to be a difficult matter, as they can outrun an ordinary domesticated horse.

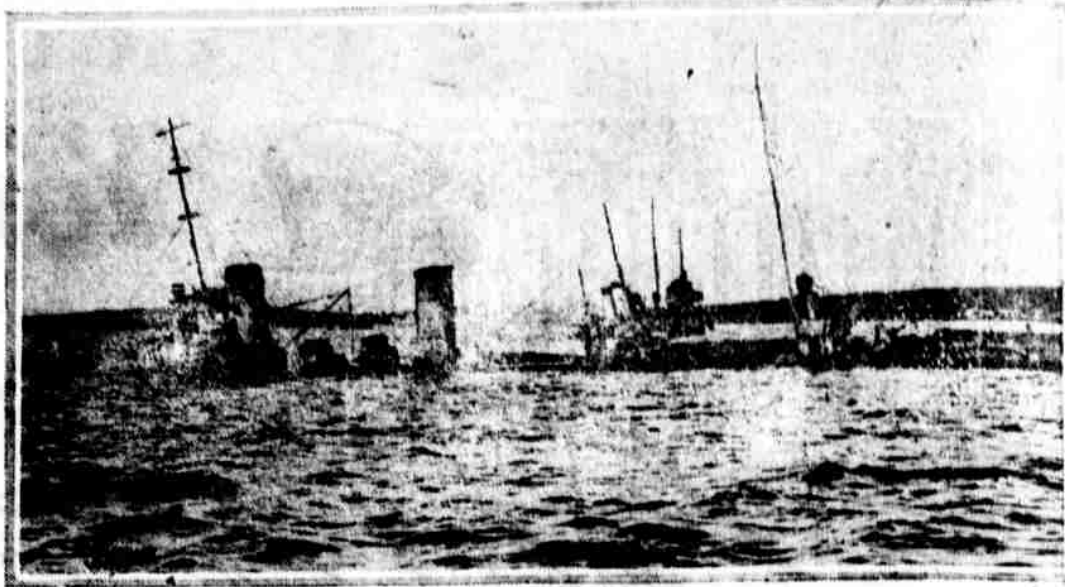

BILLINGS, Mont., July 26.—Peter Perce, formerly a grocer of this city, is believed by officers of the local chapter of the Red Cross to be the champion knitter of the northern division of the organization. Since he began knitting, Perce has spent 2,119 hours making socks, spending about 14 hours to the pair. He has credit for about 150 pairs turned in to the local Red Cross headquarters, and this record is to be submitted to division headquarters.

ALLIED COUNTRYMEN HAVE CELEBRATION IN MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, JULY 26.—Celebrations of the return of peace have been held within the last few days by nationals of the Allied countries residing here. On July 3 and 4 festivities were conducted by the Country Club or elsewhere and the stores and shops of business men of the Allied nations were closed and deserted. The fiestas included informal receptions to returned soldiers of the Allied armies.

On Sunday, July 6, two memorial services were held for Allied soldiers who died in the war. One was conducted by the French colony and the other by English-speaking people of the capital. The various foreign colonies generally cooperated in the festivities.

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BULL SOLD FOR \$50,000.
