BIRTHDAY ANNIVERSARY OF BELOVED MARY ANDERSON.

Today is the sixtieth birthday anniversary of Mary Anderson, an affectionate public still calls, Mme. Antonia de Navarro. Her latest photograph shows that she still retains most of the good looks which long procured for her pictures a bigger sale than those of any other actress. It is now more than a quarter of a century since she retired from the stage, but her artistic triumphs are still fresh in the memory of the older generation of American playgoers. From the beginning of her professional career to the end of it Miss Anderson was the subject of a veritable chorus of adulation. The purity of her private character helped to make her a popular heroine. Her natural gifts were uncommon, and her youthful triumphs were practically unmarred by a single note of hostile criticism. The former actress now resides in the old world village of Broadway, Worcestershire, where she has a delightful home, in the midst of a colony of literary and artistic celebrities.

TODAY'S ANNIVERSARIES.

- 1769—Sir Hudson Lowe, whose unpleasant duty it was to guard Napoleon at St. Helena, born in Galway, Ireland. Died in London, Jan. 10, 1844.
- 1794—Robespierre, one of the most conspicuous leaders in the French Revolution, was guillotined in Paris, Born May 6, 1758.
- 1835—Attempted assassination of Louis Philippe by Fieschi.
- 1869—Marriage of Crown Prince Frederick of Denmark and Princess Louise of Sweden.
- 1870—Napoleon III., accompanied by the Prince Imperial, left St. Cloud to join the French army in the war against Prussia.
- 1907—William D. Haywood was acquitted at Boise of the murder of ex-Gov. Steunenberg of Idaho.
- 1914—World conflict launched with the Austrian declaration of war against Serbia.
- 1915—German drive on Warsaw was brought to a standstill.
- 1916—Russians captured Brody, an important railway center in Galicia.
- 1917—President Wilson approved the formation of a War Industries Board.

HIKERS GO ON LONG JAUNTS

SAN FRANCISCO, July 28.—Old time railroad conductors and brakemen, as well as veteran employees of the various ferry boats which ply across San Francisco bay, say that never before have there been so many "hikers" starting off on jaunts thru the surrounding country.

Wearing soft caps, flannel shirts, knee breeches and heavy walking boots, and carrying a well filled knapsack and blankets, hundreds cross the ferries each day, while on Saturdays and Sundays they are numbered by the thousands. Women and young girls dress exactly as do the men, the majority of them having discarded skirts for the tight fitting breeches and leggings. Also they carry on their backs their share of the camp equipment.

Marin county, a six mile ferry ride across the bay to the north of San Francisco, is the favorite hiking ground as it presents all manner of country. Trails and roads bordering the Pacific ocean pass many fine stretches of bathing beach for those who want the water, while the hill climbers are presented with the choice of almost all kinds of mountains from the precipitous cliff to the undulating rolling lands.

No tents are carried by the walkers. They sleep out under the stars. From June to October is the "dry season" in California. The only way in which to get an umbrella wet during these months is to hold it under a running faucet.

RUMANIAN MEN CHANGE DRESS

BUCHAREST, July 28.—For the first time since Rumania, as the ancient Roman province of Dacia, adopted the short white skirt of the Roman legionaries as her special costume, the men of Rumania have changed their style of wearing apparel.

The ancient costume since the time of the Romans has been a short white tunic, supplemented with thick white wool "bag-trousers," and a heavy

coat whose lines of rich embroidery exactly follow the lines of the old Roman body armor.

The German-Bulgar-Turk looters carried away as many of the embroidered garments as they could find. The clothing brought from France by the American Red Cross has taken the place of the stolen goods.

Hospital garments of all kinds, bath robes, pajamas, hospital jackets, are being worn by the men in the villages in place of their historic national costume. A grey woolen hospital bathrobe may not be as picturesque as an embroidered tunic, but judging by the pleased look on the faces of the peasants as they leave the American Red Cross Distributing station, the substitute garment is giving perfect satisfaction.

KNIGHTS WILL PUSH WAR ACTIVITIES TO NORTHERN ALASKA
